Barron's Conditional Sales Act. The Empire of Saturday last contains the following notice of Mr. Barron's recent work on the law of conditional sales. This is the second the law of conditional sales. This is the second or third legal work from Mr. Barron's pen:

Mr. John A. Barron, the well-known author of bills of sales and chattel mortgages, has completed and presented to the public another contribution to the legal literature of Canada in the shape of a work on "The Act Respecting Conditional Sales of Chattels," 51 Vic., chapter 19, Ontario.

As is known, this act, which came into force on the let January, 1889, is framed to protect parsons dealing with the vendee of a chattel, as to which the vender has entered into an agreement with the vender has entered into an agreement with the vender has the property in the chattel shall not pass with the possession, but shall remain vested in the vender, until certain conditions procedent, the payment by instalments in the nature of rent, of the purchase money, or some stipulated part thereof, shall be fulfilled.

The author in annotating the act has devoted much attention to a careful consideration of what cases fall within and without the operation of the act. The doctrine of estoppel, by reason of the conduct of the parties to a conditional sale and as affecting third parties is fully diagnased.

There is one obviously weak point in the act which does not fail to elicit the criticism of Mr. Barron. We refer to the alternative provision requiring that the name and address of the manufacturer, ballor or vendor be painted, printed, stamped or engraved upon the chattel at the time of possession is given to the ballee. So long as this is compiled with the vendor is protected, notwithstanding that the ballee may, after having obtained possession of the chattel, obliterate the name, and thus be in a position to per-petrate the very fraud which it is the object of the act to prevent. We concur in thinking that it would have been better to have emitted this alternative and have required the simple registration of the contract.

The book contains a very useful appendix of forms, and last but not least a complete and full index, and we feel sure will at once take its place in the library of the general practitioner. At a time when each succeeding session finds our legislators laboring under the idea that new laws we must have at all events, any well-directed effort to throw light upon their enactments merits the thanks of the public generally and the legal profession in particular.

Sales were made Tuesday almost up to 4c, one load going at \$8.871 per cwt, with \$10 back; and another lot \$3.95 per cwt. Choice butchers' wire, as a usual thing, selling around 32c per h; good loads could be had at \$3.50 to \$3.624 per cwt; medium were quoted at \$3 to \$3.371 per cwt, and inferior sold at 22c to 22c per h. 




