THE ORANGE BILL.

Mr. Curran's Amendment Rejected by 124 to 23-Mr. Barron's Speech-A Tory Organ's Lie About Mr. Barron Natiod. In the house on Monday last,-

Mr. BARRON, on the resumption of the ebate on the third reading of the bill to incorporate the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, and the amendment by Mr. Curran that the said order be not allowed to hold processions in provinces which have made legal enactments against them, said: I must confess to a feeling of disappointment that the time of the introduction of this bill does not permit me to answer some of the arguments which were advanced against it on two former occadone, namely, in 1883 and 1885. I am the more disappointed owing to the circumstance that my hon, friend from Montreal Centre made reference to the effect of the arguments used on the two occasions I have mentioned, when he said that they convinced the house that it was inadvisable to pass the bill. I am rejoiced to know that time has done what argument failed to do upon that occasion. Time has convinced the majority of hon, members that it is advisable and desirable in the interests of justice that the Orangemen should receive incorporation. The hon, gentleman from Montreal Centre, although gentleman from Montreal Centre, although foremost in opposing the bill upon the two occasions to which he has referred, now concedes the principle of the bill before the house. I rejoice to know that these words "Property and civil rights" cannot be locked upon as an obstacle by this house in the passage of the bill. It is also pleaking to

see that the statement that the Orange society is illegal, and that the word "secrecy" that was applied to the organization in the years to which I have alluded are no longer used against incorporation. It is also extended to notice that the argument is not iefactory to notice that the argument is not used in the house, that because the Orange society in Protestant: a society for the advancement of Protestantism—that it should not be incorporated. I take this opportunity of saying that I would not for one moment belong to the society if I knew that its Procestant principles in any way interfered with meting out justice to those who may be Roman Catholica or opposed to us in matters religious. The hon, member who moved the amendment admitted the principle of the bill. I am glad that the hon, member, who has so skilfully that the hon. member, who has so skilfully managed the bill, so fairly and so candidly has refused, as representing the society, to accept the amendment, which, I think, to accept the amendment, which, I think, is a most insulting one. There is nothing in this bill whatever that touches or repeals the lith chapter of the consolidated statutes of Lower Canada, which renders illegal certain secret societies. There is nothing in this bill legalizing secret societies. It legalized it simply for benevolent purposes. tartling Developments in the Benwell Murder - Burchell under Arrest at Niagara-Wealthy Young Englishmen Enticed to Canada and Murdered for their Money.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., March 4.-The Surchell arrest is opening up one of the darkest and most diabolical plots that has ever been chronicled in the history of Ontario. Detective Murray, since his arrival last evening, has been hard at work on the work on the case. Douglas Raymond Pelly, the young Englishman, who has been, up to last evening, in company with Burchell, made a statement in court this morning that plainly showed there had been a deep plot concocted in England. where unsuspecting young men were lured into an agreement where there were big profits in a business at Nisgara Falls, owned and operated by Burchell, and money extorted according to the sure net profits the victims were to money extorted according to the sure net profits the victims were to receive, and he (Pelly) handed over to Burchell £173 sterling before leaving Eugland, he to come out to this country and assist in the running of the business. The whole thing was made palatable by the introduction of a woman, claiming to be Burchell's wife and daughter of David Stephenson, a high official in the London and Northwestern and daugater of David Stephenson, a high official in the London and Northwestern ratiroad, England. played on the flute. YOUNG PELLY CROSS-EXAMINED. NIAGARA FALLS, March 5.-The evidencetaking against Burchell was resumed before I olice Magistrate Hill this morning at ten o'clock. Young Pelly was again placed in the witness box and was crossexamined and verified his statement of yesterday, adding some other statements which he could recall to memory such as about what Burchell had told him (Pelly) what a nice place "Pine Pond" was and that he would drive out to it in the summer four-in-hand. "Pine Pond" is near the place where Benwell's body was found. The prisoner told him he had never been at Peinesten but knew that Parls was the at Princeton, but knew that Paris was the at Princeton, but knew that Paris was the nearest station to where the murder was committed. He heard Mrs. Burchell speak of Pickthall, as "that person coming down stairs," when they were standing in the hail of the Merropolitan hotel, while they were in New York. Burchell told Benwell he gave him the keys for his trunks so he could pass Benwell's herrore. Dep. reeve LENNON, chairman, read the report, which recommended that the town solicitor he author zed to take action relets 2 and 3, Queen's equare, and that they be advertised for sale in the local papers, plans of buildings proposed to be erected to

be submitted by those applying; that the east ward "dump-ground" be effect for sale at the same time; that the garbage cart be disposed of to the best advantage and at once; that the market tolls be not sold this year, but that a man be employed to look after them; that a new stove be placed in the lock up, the present one being broken and unsafe; and flially that the reeves of Lindsay and Ops confer together on the best disposition to make of the hospital building....After some little discussion the report was adopted.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE. Reeve WILLIAMS, chairman, read the re-

port, which recommended payment of accounts aggregating \$353.89 C. un. CRANDELL rose to ask a question regarding the solicitor's bill, to which Coun. Com-stock objected as being out of order. This riled the captain, and he gave his view of a councillor's duty at some length, the same being somewhat to Coun. Com-tock's disadvantage. He (Coun. Crandel!) was willing to treat every one as a gentleman, but he would not submit to being "biccked" at every turn as he was last year. Ratering to the solicitor's bil, he er quired why the same was not rendered up to date so that citizens might know just what they had to pay.....It was pointed out that the account covered fourteen months, but was not rendered up to date because several suits were in progress, the costs in which might be awarded the town....

The report was adopted. A POINTER FROM THE CHAIR.

Mayor SMYTH, referring to the passage at arms between Couns. Cometock and Crandell, said he was partly to blame himself, as he had not noticed that Coun. C. andeit was out of order. He hoped it would be the last time that personalities would be indulged in around the council board in indulged in around the council board—in fact he might as well say at once that he was not going to sit in the chair and listen to anything of the kind..... Reeve Will-Liams said the solicitor's bill was no doubt correct—he could vouch for most of the items himself. Coun. Crandeil had a perfect right to ask questions, but he objected to his style of duing so. He had to pitch into two or three members and take up half an hour of valuable time before he reached his subject. REPORT OF STREET AND BRIDGE COMMITTEE.

Dep. reeve FISHER, chairman, read the report, which stated that contracts had been let for 100 cords of field stone at \$2.25 per cord; breaking same, \$2.25; 12.000 ft. of codar had been bought for side waik stringers, and the committee recommended that 65,000 ft. of gang-sawed twelve-inch plank be purchased by tender. Complaints had been made by parties that the cleaning of snow off the sidewaks had been carelesely done by some of the contractors; hereafter arrievances coming within the committee's done by some of the contractors; hereafter arievances coming within the committee's jurisdiction might be fyled with the town clerk, and would be investigated daily. The report also recommerded that Fremont Crandeil be paid the sum of \$30, balance of gravel contract, he to pay costs of suit entered against the town for recovery of same.....Coun, Cahill pointed out that some 10 in. plank would be required to patch sidewalks already built with plank of that width, and a motion was passed that 20,000 ft. of 10 in. plank be inserted in the tender. The report was adopted.

Coun. Comstock, chairman, read an in ventory of the fire apparatus stored in the fire hall, and said that a number of articles were missing and others needed repairing.....Reeve WILLIAMS remarked that engineer Makins was of the opinion that 500 ft of canvas hose, rubber-lined, should be procured at once....Coun. Comstock said he had asked the engineer to bring in a report, and then switched the discussion around to the fire hall door, which required a new lock and a number of keys. Finally it was arranged that these necessaries be procured and a key left with the chief of police, any impetuous person breaking in the door to pay for his fun....Dep.-reeve Lennon suggested that all fire apparatus be branded, as it could REPORT OF FIRE AND WATER COMMITTEE.

Comstock thought the motion was out of order unless Dr. Herriman was prepared to move that someone be dropped off the various committees to make room for the captain; he could, however, be placed on the committees to which Mr. Hudson had been appointed. A general discussion then took place, various coun-cillors taking the view that it would be contrary to the rules of council for any committee to be given the balance of power; this would be true of several if Coun. Crandell were added to them. Finally it was moved by Dep. reeve LENNON, and recorded by Coun. Comstock, that Coun. Crandell be appointed to the positions formerly held by Mr. Hudson. Coun. CRANDELL then took the floor .Coun. CRANDELL then took the floor

and opened out by rema king that it was strange, if councillors wished to bury the hatchet and smake the pipe of peace, that they would at the very outset make such a strong effort to cust him from the important committees. If he served on them all he would thus b-come conversant with every subject brought before them; if he objected the discussion would take place in committee and a deal of time would thus be saved in council. However, if they threw down the gauntlet and tried to shelve him he was prepared to pick it and do battle vigorously; he would not allow anything to be rushed through until he understood it thoroughly.....Dep. reeve FISHER said he thought Coun. Herriman's motion did not interfere with any rule, and he would support it if only for the sake of peace....Coun. HERRIMAN said that Capt. Crandell, whatever might be his faults, was possessed of large experience and he could not see why the town should not have the benefit of it. The captain had given it out that if appointed it would mean peace and quietness around the council board—and that would be a grand result....The motion was then put and resulted in a tie-eix for and six against. Mayor Smyth cast his vote into the captain's side of the scale and the motion was declared carried.
