PATRICK'S DAY IN BRECHIN,-St. Patrick's day was observed in St. Andrew's church on the 17th with all the usual solemnity of a religious fete of the highest order. Rev. Father McMahon, the pastor, was the celebrant of high mass. The church was well filled considering the inclemency of the weather. At the conclusion of the mass the calebrant delivered an interesting and instructive paneggric en St. 1 atrice, beginning by saying that his hearers had assembled once more to show their respect and reverence for Ireland's patron saint, and that he felt sure their thoughts were carried back to the scenes of their youth in the beloved land which they still call their home. He then told his listeners in simple but elequent language how four hundred years and more had passed away before the light of the gospel was shed upon Ireland and that St. Patrick, who was captured, was the one chosen by God to apread it in that pagan land. When St. Patrick was first known he appeared as a slave herding cattle on the mountains of Antrim, where after-wards his voice was heard dictating laws for the whole nation, publishing in the ancient Irish language the divine rites which he himself had studied so long, changing the manners, customs, habits changing the manners, customs, habits and religion of the entire population and establishing Christian faith and purity in the hearts of the Irish people. St. Patrick's preaching so esptivated the bards, poets, philosophers and friends of the land that they not only accepted the gospel from his lips without question and without a sigh of sorrow, but they also became its apostles, so that in a very short time the whole Irish nation was Christian and Catholic in their religion, and the aged saint in the their religion, and the aged saint in the agony of death lifted up his hand and blessed the land that from end to end was Christian and Catholic. The rev. father then went on to show that St. Parrick was blessed the land that from end to end was Christian and Catholic. The rev. father then went on to show that St. Parrick was a truly spostolic man. He pessessed knowledge, accurate, extensive and profound, of the entire deposit of the Christian faith as it had been revealed by God to His church and the exemplification of this was in his life and actions. When Christ came upon earth he came not merely to instruct the people and to teach them the knowledge of the truth that formed the burden of his divine teachings, but he also came to give man a law that would make him holy in action as well as in the understanding of that divine action, and such a man was St. Patrick, as his love of prayer and incessant toliclearly proved. Our saint used to retire to the solitary mountain of "Croagh Patrick," in the western part of Ireland and within sound of the mighty Atlantic waves that strike against its fron-bound coast. There, from Ash Wednesday until Easter Sunday, no man saw him, but his voice was heard in prayer on the mountain tops. 


