We have on more than one occasion felt it to be our duty to protest against the code of journalistic othics exemplified by the Warder newspaper during the last few years; and we have maintained that it was the duty of leading conservatives of this town and counts, as good citizens, publicly to express their disapproval of the conduct of the editor of the Warder in attacking individuals and classes, and allowing his newspaper to be made the vehicle of attacks by others. This community has had to undergo a most trying ordeal; to many individuals it must have been most painful and distressing; and the absence of any marked expression of condemnation from those who ought to have had a higher sense of their responibility as citizens and neighbors, not only seemed a warrant for further license but an indication that ordinary measures for self-protection could not hope to suc. ceed. An attack of a flagrant character on Mr. Joseph Cooper resulted in an appeal to the courts, and the case was tried at the assizes this week. A report is printed on another page; but we find it to be impossible this week to print the charge of Mr. Justice Rose to the jury. The charge was a grand moral lesson to this community; but we fear it will make but faint impression upon the defendant. It remains to be seen if he will conduct his paper in accordance with the principles laid down by his lordship. 
