Regular Meeting-The Irwin Estate Case - Market By-Law and Clerk - The Chief Constable-Electric Light-The Weilington-et Drain.

A regular meeting of the town fathers was held Monday evening in the council chamber, business being taken up at eight o'clock sharp, all the members being in their seats. Town solicitor G. H. Hopkins and Bowman Bros., engineers, were also in attendance. The minutes of the last meeting were read by the clerk and were confirmed by the council.

Dep.-reeve LENNON, chairman, then read the report of the committee, which re-commended that the offer of Mr. John O'Neill to purchase the east ward dumping ground for \$75 be accepted; that Mr. Neil Callaghan be appointed to the position of market clerk; and that Mr. W. Logan's offer of \$1,500 for lots 2 and 3 queen's square (the Irvin property) be accepted, provided that certain conditions be counted

Mr. D. J. McIntyre, solicitor for the trustees of the Irvin estate, was heard at some length concerning the town's course some length concerning the town's course with regard to the Irvin lease. The contention of his clients was that a certain clause in the lease provided that possession could be secured from year to year. This he candidly admitted was not his opinion, but lawyers, like other people, did not always agree. Rather than see the matter resolve itself into a coatly law suit he had advised the trustees to abide by the decision of the council—a just and fair one he knew it would be. Mr. Irvin had made extensive improvements, and these called for some compensation; they might also see fit to forego a small amount claimed as rent. Mr. McIntyre also alluded, on behalf of
