SMOKING AND SMOEKRS.

A Kansas City cigar dealer says the increase in the consumption of cigarettes was wonderful up to a few months ago, but lately there has been a noticeable reaction. It is safe to say that nine-tenths of the cigarettes sold are smoked by boys under 16 years of age. A cigarette dealer's opinion would probably be differ-

Students who use tobacco in any form are denied admission to the University of the Pacific at San Jose, Cal.

In consequence of the women's crusade against cigarette pictures, a Washington dealer has dressed all his scantily clad works of art in little skirts of tissue paper. From the smallest to the largest tigure they are all clad in white and pink and blue skirts, gathered at the waist, and pasted over the figure from the bust to the ankles.

The French Anti-Tobacco Society has made experiments to determine the effect of tobacco smoke upon meat and vegetables ready for cooking or prepared for the table, and that result has indicated that the smoke deposits all its poisonous qualities in the food. A piece of rare meat, after being exposed for some time to tobacco smoke, was offered to a dog, which refused to touch it. It was then concealed in some palatable covering, and the dog ate it and died of nicotine poisoning.

Bustless Iron.

The rustless process, which has been until lately an experiment, has now demonstrated that great economy can be used not only in ice pipes, but in every article where iron is used. In the past year over 2,000,000 kettles have been subected to this process in Pittsburgh. The method is very peculiar. After the article is made it is put into a furnace about 3 feet high, 15 feet long, and 8 feet broad. The farnace is made in an oval shape, air tight. After the iron has been in the furnace for two hours and has attained almost a white heat, the air that comes through the regenerators and air valves is shut securely off; and the furnace is made air tight.

Afterthe air has been shut off the super-teater, which is located in the combustion chamber at the rear of the furnace. and at right angles from the air valves, is opened, and the furnace is filled with steam and kept in this condition for eight hours. At short intervals a small valve is opened, so so to allow an emitus of steam in their transce, allowing fresh steam to be put into the furnace.

When the articles have been accom plished the formation of magnetic oxide upon the iron surface. They are then put into an acid well, which is the last treatment. THE REGREEVY SCANDAL witer county will a

Tarte is their agent, and his orders are to destroy Langevin if


