The Late Adam Hadepoth, Q. C., M. P. The saying that "Death loves a shining mark" has received this week a local and amented illustration that has caused general sorrow at the sudden and unexannouncement of Mr. Hudspeth's serious illness, with the probably fatal termination, came as a great shock to the community on Monday. He had been the previous day the picture of health, though comewhat worn by parliamentary duties He had recovered from the recent accident by which, through a fall on the slippery walk, he sustained a fracture of the arm. Mr. Hudspeth attended St. Paul's church Sunday evening, and retired to rest about ten o'clock. Monday morning as he did not rise at the usual hour he was called, but an he appeared to be eleeping he was left undiscurbed. On being again called it was noticed he was breathing very heavily, and Dr. Kempt, the family physician, was summoned. It was at once apparent that

it was a case of apoplexy. Three other doctors were summoned in consultation. The patient lingered in an unconscious state until five o'clock in the afternoon when "the end came."

Mr. Hudspeth was still in the prime of life, being in his fifty-fourth year. He was born at Cobourg in December, 1836. His father was headmester of the grammar school there and the son received his education under his father. The family removed to Lindsay where Adam studied law, and was called to the bar in 1837. He soon made his mark as a lawyer and acquired a large practice. He was a man of public spirit and liberality and took an active part in all measures calculated to advance the material, moral or educational interests of the community. He naturally advance the material, moral or educational interests of the community. He naturally took an active part in politice as a liberal conservative, and was a popular platform specker in the various election campaigns. In 1875 he unsuccessfully contented South Victoria for the local legislature against Hoo. S. C. Wood, and in 1887 he was chosen the conservative standard bearer for the communa and was elected by a chosen the conservative standard bearer for the commons and was elected by a small majority. He had not resigned in time the position of revising barrister for North Victoria which he had held, and heing thereby disqualified he resigned his seat, and after a seen contest was again re-elected by a small majority. He did not take a prominent part in parliament, but was a valued supporter of the government and a useful member in many ways.

Mr. Hudspeth was personally popular and widely respected. He was a liberal natron of athletic and other organizations. He took a warm interest in educational progress and was a member of the high

natron of athletic and other organ'z silons. He took a warm interest in educational progress and was a member of the high school board, having for some years been chairman. He was a leading member of the profession; a bencher of the law society of Ontario; deputy judge of the county; revising barrieter for North Ontario, and a queen's counsel. It was considered probable that ere long he would have been called to the superior court bench.

Mr. Hudeneth was a member of the Caurch of Eagland and for many years was church warden. In 1868 he married Harriette, daughter of the late R. S. Miles of Brockville, a retired chief factor of the the Hudeon's Bay Co. This happy usion was broken by the lamented death of Mrs. Hudepeth five years ago. Three some and five daughters are left to mourn the loss of a devoted and affectionate fasher.

Mr. Hudepeth's early death is a great public loss to the community and well many public representative positions. He was a warm-hearted, generous man, liberal and kindly. In his business and professional capacity he commanded the confidence and regard of a very wide and extensive clientele and, in fact, of the community in general.
