THE GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED BY A MAJORITY OF FROM 25 TO 30.

A CRUSHING DEFEAT FOR THE OPPOSITION.
ONTARIO DECLARES FOR RELIGIOUS TOLERATION.
WEST VICTORIA REDEEMED BY 450.
A Magnificent Majority for Dr. McKay.

The fifth of June has once more proved memorable in the history of the province and glorious in the annals of the Reform party. Another grand and noble victory has been recorded for Oliver Mowat, for the reform party, for the principles of religious toleration and freedom, for good honest administration, and for the right and the true. Another verdict of condemnation has been registered by the people of the province against the ignoble and unpatriotic appeals to race and religious prejudices; against the unworthy attempts to stir up old and worn-out sectional feelings; against the pandering to bigotry and narrowness, which marked and marred to a deplorable extent the unfortunate policy of the ill-fated and deservedly unsuccessful opposition. It would have been a bad day and a sad day for Ontario if the people of this province had by their votes on the fifth day of June given their high approval to a policy which William R. Meredith himself denounced four years ago as being one which, if he had then advocated it, he would have been "an enemy to his country and his God." His supporters advocated it then and it was rejected and condemned. He has now presented it as the great issue and the condemnation has been of the strongest, most sweeping and most decisive character.

The reformers of West Victoria are to be congratulated upon their grand victory won under the tremendous disadvantage of a heavy rain and thunderstorm, which prevented a great many voters from coming out. The splendid figures rolled up in Lindsay and Oshawa during these circumstances are most creditable. In Mariposa and Eldon a grand day's work was done, and we warmly congratulate those townships. The handsome three-figure majority we predicted for Dr. McKay has gone beyond the most sanguine anticipations of our most enthusiastic supporters. Woodville may well be proud of its representative and of its fine quota of sixty to his majority. The verdict for West Victoria is especially significant in that it has stamped the strongest popular condemnation on the slanderous course of the principal organ in its bitter and unscrupulous attacks on individuals and religions, and the reckless lying and blackguardism which was exhibited during the campaign by Mr. Cross's principal platform speaker, who is also the Tory organizer. The unprincipled conduct of this notorious individual has disgraced the conservative party and disgusted many respectable and independent conservatives. But we must say that most of the leading conservatives allowed the attacks to go on uncondemned, or at least publicly uncondemned, (how mean and contemptible was the private condemnation! Let these "respectabilities" have the courage and manliness to stand up like men and openly condemn what they feel is a scandal and disgrace); and were quite willing that the party should get the benefit of the most wicked, wanton and disgraceful proscription of newspaper power in its attacks on respectable citizens, leading reformers and Roman Catholics. They so-called respectable conservatives were willing to keep silent while week after week low appeals were made to religious prejudices, and wicked efforts were made to revive old passions. The public verdict has now been registered; the slanderer goes down in ignominy to keep company with the rejected and condemned of Peel.

BRACEBRIDGE.
A FATAL ACCIDENT.—Last Friday afternoon a fatal accident occurred at Dunburgh which resulted in one George Clark, known throughout the district as "Moose" an account of his enormous size, losing his life. He was engaged with a number of workmen in breaking a jam of logs by the use of dynamite, which part of the work was under his supervision. He had just lit the fuse connecting with a charge placed in the centre of a log, when it appeared he did not retreat far enough off after doing so, consequently he received the whole force of one blast of the charged log in the right side of the body. He had the instant returned to work, immediately after the discharge, they found Clark lying on the ground and unable to rise. He recovered consciousness in a time, however, when he related the cause of the accident to his comrades, smoked his pipe, and died in sixteen hours afterwards. It was found on examination that his arm was broken, his leg broken in three places and the whole side of his body thoroughly crushed. Mr. T. Arnot of Bracebridge was also hurt, but not seriously.—(Gazette).
