

BRACEBRIDGE.

A FATAL ACCIDENT.—Last Friday afternoon a fatal accident occurred at Dunchurch which resulted in one George Clark,
known throughout the district as "Moose"
on account of his enormous size, losing his
life. He was engaged with a number of
workmen in breaking a jam of logs by the
use of dynamite. which part of the work was under his supervision. He had just lit the fuse connecting with a charge placed in the centre of a log, when it appeared he did not retreat far enough off after doing so, consequently he received the whole force of one half of the charged log in the right side of the body. When the workmen returned to work, immediately after the discharge, they found Ciark lying on the ground and picked him up for dead. He recovered consciousness in a time, however, when he related the cause of the accident to his comrades, smoked his pipe, and died in sixteen hours afterwards. It was found on examination that his arm was broken, his leg broken in three places and the whole side of his body frightfully crushed. Mr. T. Arnott of Bracebridge was also hurt, but not seriously.—[Gazette.
