Toronto Live Stock Market. Although cable advices of Monday showed a steadier feeling in the British markets the Toroato market is still dull and low, and while there was less purchasing on the part of exportvicinity of hindeay. In last week's Post there ere they, for the most part, paid lower prices for their cattle than have hitherto been ruling. A cable received by a prominent exporter Tuesday said that his bunch of cattle had been sold at Liverpool on Monday at a loss of between \$10 and \$12 per head. The story is the same from all local shippers. They have sent their cattle mostly bought at high prices, over to the othe, side, and have met with weak and declining markets. Canadian exporters have lost heavily this season, and the ond is not yet. Some of our this season, and the end is not yet. Some or our smaller local exporters have been badly bitten. Offerings of export stock Tuesday were fairly large, but the demand was not sufficiently active to absorb all that came in, and some had to be held over. In very few cases was more than 5e per ib paid for export stock, although a couple of small sales may have been made at \$5.12; per cwt. The range of prices, however, was from \$4.80 to \$5 per owt. Among the sales were:

Rogs—Offerings to-day were all rough, mixed lots, not a straight load coming in. On this account prices are lower. Stores are very inactive, and lower prices are being paid for them. Old sows are not quoted higher than \$4.50 per owt., and the highest price paid to-day was \$5.20 per owt. Among the sales were:
