A YOUNG HERO WITO SAVES A VILLAGE. Freddie Boover of Green river is the hero of Pickering township. His presence of mind saved the village of Whitevale from almost certain destruction. On Tuesday afternoon of last week he noticed that the creek, which runs near his home, and the creek, which runs near his home, and passes almost through the centre of the quiet little village, was rapidly rising, and had siready commenced to overflow its banks. "If those top boards are not taken off that dam will be swept away, and then —," he commenced to soliloquise when he suddenly broke it off and made a rush for his father's barn, saddled a horse and started for Whitevais on the dead gallop. It was a long ride, but the lives of a couple of hundred people were at stake, and he push. hundred people were at stake, and he pushed his horse forward with all possible haste. He had fairly out-distanced the coming torrent. But his work was not yet completed. Not losing a moment of the time which was now so precious he hastly called to a man, telling him of the impending danger, and in an almost incredibly short space the larger portion of the male population were at the dam, which is used by the Whitevale grist and planing mill, removing the upper planks which were holding the water back. The most of the work had been done when the roaring torrent was heard in the cletatice. Before the men had time to return to the mainland the rushing waters were upon them. In a jiffy it cut a new channel between the mill race and the creek, and left them on an island. With a good deal of difficulty a rope was flung across to them, and securely fastened to a cree. By this means all but three got scrose and these resolved to remain where they were rather than risk their lives in the stream. The three men were Henry Winner, Dun Moody and Bon Lynde. The villagers could do nothing but sing the praise of the brave and witty youngster, who, they claim, saved them and their homes from the devastating elements.
