"WIMAN ENLIGHTENING THE WORLD." Mr. Wiman's reported proposal to take no holiday this year but to devote the double time next year to deliver one hundred addresses in Ontario on the advantages of unrestricted reciprocity presents "a rare treat" and a picturesque spectacle for the people of this province.

Mr. Wiman's "program" from Berlin to Montreal is an undertaking that denotes remarkable energy and activity, and it will no doubt excite wide interest. The question of the expediency of the tour on such a liberal scale has probably not been seriously considered by Mr. Wiman, who is a man of busy mind and as sanguine temperament. Had he given it much thought he would have concluded—as he may yet conclude—that it would be wiser to "go a-fishing" in Muskoka or deer hunting in the northern wilds, and to give the Canadian people not more than one or two public addresses on this question.

The Toronto papers are now admitting that the carnival was not a success, but they "hurl back with scorn" the imputation that Toronto displayed a hostile spirit in taking to the Hamilton idea of last summer. Toronto is ashamed of itself, however, and the Mail represents the feeling when it says that the "Lindsay waters of forgetfulness and oblivion may close over the entire business."
