

the same connection it may be noted that while a year ago coean freights were quoted at 60 to 65c, without insurance, to-day they are at 35c, and in some cases 10s. However, exporters are paying here about je per it more than they were at the same time last year. Not many fat export stock were on the market Tuesday, but a few sold at 45c to 5c per lb. There were, however, quite a number of export cattle on the market that were going through to Montreal, and one exporter had about 250 head, which he had purchased in the country at from 45c to 15c per lb. Stockers were offering very freely, and although there was good buying prices were from 1 to 10 per lb lower, the decline being due entirely to the large supply. They sold at 35c to 10 per lb. Butchers' cattle—Were also weaker, in sympathy with other lines. For anything good prices were fairly well maintained, but inferior stock went decidedly lower. Export sheep—Offerings were lighter, and as there were fairly good buying prices were well maintained. Cables from Liverpool quote finest sheep at 130 per ft. in Liverpool, but a year ago they were selling at 160. However, freights are lower this year, which almost counterbalances the other side. Ewes and wethers were selling at 14 to 150 per 16 Tuesday, and rams at 1c. Among the sales were: 232 sheep, 140 lbs......at 80 01; per lb. 6 75

Butchers' sheep.—Are to a great extent nominal. A few onlie are being picked out from among the export loads and sell at \$1.50 to \$5 each.

Lambs—Are easy at the late decline, although values have not further depreciated. There is a fair amount of buying, but offerings are liberal and quite sufficient for the demand. Prices range from \$3.50 to \$1.25 each. Some of the sales
