COMMERCIAL NEWS.

OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, JULY 24, 1920.

Farmers are now entering upon harvest work with promise of a fair but not heavy crop.

Irwin, Green & Co., of Chicago, in a late report says: 'Most of the reports from [American] winter wheat fields tell of disappointingly small yield, but that quality is about equal to the best ever known.'

The latter fact should furnish argument in favor of demand from abroad at least equal to our ability to meet it.

Importing countries of the old world will want a big lot of wheat this year, and the imposition of duties will but increase prices which consumers in some of them will have to pay for daily bread.

As the cold, wet weather had worked avoidable damage in those lands which are directly exposed to the moisture of the Gulf Stream.

Latest advice intimates reduced exportation power on the part of Russia for similar reasons. It should surely be safe to count on a minimum of a hundred million bushels as wanted from us [the U.S.] this year.

Unless the export of a big boom in prices, the total for the year ending with last month being about one hundred and ten million. Our ability to supply so much on any terms is decidedly problematical, as there is no doubt of heavily weighted million bushels in our visible supply (including private stock) being about all there was to spare from last crop.

Hence it may be considered certain that a big crop of prices for current year wheat with some buyers to much greater extent than usual. They can get quotations almost where they please, but this is for spring wheat they will send and hold them skyward.

On the contrary trade has been so thorough cut into the belt in low figures that a big boom in prices could only be effected in the form of a severe boom in prices, if at all.

No. 1 Manitoba hard wheat is quoted at 21c. Oats in Toronto have advanced 2c., being quoted at 4c. and 5c.

The official report on the Russian harvest expresses doubt of an average abundance.

The Standard's Moscow correspondent says it is suspected this report aims to raise the normal price of Russian grain in view of the Indian and American yields being below the average.

Toronto Live Stock Market.

There were 60 loads brought in Tuesday, including nearly 900 sheep and lambs, 3,931 cattle, 120 hogs. Last week's receipts were 3,861 cattle, 1,052 sheep and 513 hogs.

Owing to continued heavy receipts the general market was weaker, especially in the cattle line, the prices for which were low all round.

The high prices realized by stockers lately has had the effect of causing farmers to rush in their spare stock and the market has been unable to stand the increased supply.

If receipts will keep up even lower prices may be expected. Some of the stuff was unsold at the close of the market and some was sent out to Montreal. Buyers were present from Montreal and Sudbury.

Export cattle and stockers—There was not a great deal of buying for foreign markets Tuesday, and prices ranged from \$4.75 to \$12.20 per cwt. with one or two choice lots going at 50 per cent. Stockers were about a cent lower, and ranged from \$3.25 to \$3.80 per cwt. Representative sales of export stock and cattle were:
