COMMERCIAL NEWS. OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, } Farmers are now entering upon harvest work with promise of a fair but not heavy crop, and with prospects of better prices than of late years. It is evident wheat will command a better price, as the weather and other conditions have been unfavor-Irwin, Green & Co., of Chicago, in a late report say: "Most of the reports from [American] winter wheat fields tell of disappointingly small yield, but that quality is about equal to the best ever known. The latter fact should furnish argument in favor of demand from abroad at least equal to our ability to meet it. The principal importing countries of the old world will want a big lot of wheat this cereal year, and the imposition of duties will but increase prices which consumers in some of them will have to pay for daily bread, as the cold, wet weather had worked untild damage in those lands which are directly exposed to the mointure of the Gulf stream. Latest sovices intimate reduced exporting power on the part of Russia for similar reasons. It should surely be safe to count on a minimum of a hundred million bushele as wanted from us [the U.S.] this year, unless in the event of a big boom in prices, the total for the year ending with last must being about one hundred and ten million. Our ability to supply so much on any forms is decidedly problematical, as there is now no doubt of barely twenty million bushele in our visible supply (including private atocks) being about all there was to spare from lest cop. Hence it may be considered certain that fixing of prices for durrent cereal year rests with home tenders to much greater extent than senal. They can put quotations almost where they please, but this is not saying they will send and hold them exyward. On the contrary trade has been so thoroughly educated into the beilef in low figures that a sharp advance could only be effected in the face of a strong home redetence, if at all No. I Mentions hard wheat is quoted at \$1.50.
