Our proposal to do this is as follows; To build in a convenient and central position a grain elevator with all modern improvements for perfect cleaning and rapid handling with a capacity of at least 100,000 bushels. To do this we have obtained butters natent from the Chaptic Grovers. trained letters patent from the Ontario govern-ment to form a company called "The Lindsay Grain Elevator Co'y," with a capital stock of \$20,000, about \$5,000 of which is already sub-scribed. We have also procured from the Midland railway s lease at nominal rate of the ground on which the old Midland freight shed stands, on which to build the required elevator, which we consider the most suitable site available. It is estimated that the proposed building, power and machinery will cost about \$20,000 We invite those interested in the grain trade of Lindsay and those who desire the prosperity of our town to subscribe thereto. The members of our firm will take stock to the extent of have no preference over any or all others. It is suggested that the charges be made as moder-ate as possible with a view to repay a dividend of five per cent., or not more than six per cent, and to regulate the tolls charged with this view. The weather continues favorable for the rowing crops, but rather a shower too much for harvesting. The outlook con-

-ALondon cable to a New York paper sava : "The weather this week has been from the point of view of the crops. All the country market towns report alcomy despondency among the farmers, and general advances in the price of breadstuffs. In some places the rice was temporarily forced by the fact that English wheat was exhausted, and that continental dealers had intercepted foreign cargoes intended for England. Most dismal reports continue to come from France, where the damage seems more general than here. The love of the grain over on the single plain Le Beauge is estimated at \$10,000. The price of bread has already been raised in the provinces, and the Farte balance are only restrained from following suit by the representations of the ministers. Apparently this is gaing to be the worst food.

Champion potato, the introduction of which in 1880 was so beneficial to Ireland, had run itself out, and some new variety must be brought from America.

The wheat markets in Britain and the States are much higher than a week ago. In Chicago there has been an advance of 6c to 6½c, the highest price being yesterday. The unfavorable outlook for European crops, as well as the shortage in the United States, accounts for the higher range of values. The visible supply of wheat shows a small decrease for the weak, while the amount afloat increased about a like quantity. Corn has also advanced, owing chiefly to the dry weather in the States, where but a small yield is now anticipated.

Last week's Mark Lane Express says that the brilliant weather on Tuesday and Wednesday revived the hopes of the farmers, but tremendous downpours since have seriously injured their prospects. The expectations on the acreage of 1889 shave lessened one million quarters as regards wheat, although oats and bariey are uncertain English wheat in London advanced 2s 6d on the fortnight, with a smaller advance northward, most markets advanced 6d to 1s. The trade in foreign wheat was disappointing: stocks are advanced 6d to 1s. The trade in foreign wheat was disappointing; stocks are liberal, but the markets show no animation. Samples of new barley have been coming forward freely, from lows mainly, and in almost every instance the quality has called forth expressions of the most favorable character. This was of good weight, sound and in every way desirable, only a little stained, but advices coming with samples stated that they were not a good representation and that the crop would average better.
