

A NUMBER OF BY-LAWS.

A by-law to regulate town drainage, brought in by Dep.-reeve Lennon in accordance with notice of motion given at last meeting, was received and read a first time, and the council then went into committee of the whole on the electric light and waterworks contracts and a by-law to appoint a board of police commissioners. Coun. Crandell occupied the chair of state. The electric light contract occupied some little time, much diversity of opinion existing as to the proper elevation for the lamps—some favored placing them 45 feet from mother earth; others again insisting that 30 or 35 feet would be ample. It was finally decided that the latter figure should be the standard. The contract calls for twenty-five 1,000 nominal candle-power lamps, to be lighted at least 300 nights per year from dark to midnight, and at such other times as the mayor may decide upon reasonable notice being given.... The drainage and electric light by-laws were given a tnird reading.

The by-law appointing Mayor Smyth, Police Magistrate O'Leary and Judge Dean a board of police commissioners was then read a second time. Dep.-Reeve Lennon supported the proposal strongly, while Coun. Brown and Dep.-reeve Fisher opposed it just as strenuously; the latter, warming up to his work, termed the course advocated a relic of the dark ages and a species of despotism. If the commissioners were to be elected by the people yearly he would not object, but let the power be once placed in their hands it would be found impossible to remove it. Reeve Williams said the creation of a board of commissioners was warranted by the circumstances.
