COMMERCIAL NEWS.

OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LANDSAY, Aug. 28, 1890.

Mr. Henry F. Moore, editor of the Mar Lane Express, came out in the Parisian the other day. He is going to the Northwest to inquire into the wheat yield there this season. He stated to a Montreal Witness reporter that the crop prospects in England when he left were fair. Wheat would yield about 28j bushele to the acre. Potatose were a poor crop, the disease this year being most malignant. Prices for Northwest wheat would be very good as all the harvests in the world, with the exception of that in Austro-Hungary, were poor. England would require about eighteen million quarters from foreign sources.

The American Earley Grep.

Mr. O. G. Spann, of the firm of Spann & Chandler, Buffalo, who has kept posted regarding the barley crop, gives the following as the most reliable and generally accepted report of the yield and condition in the most important sections of the country: Reports from all leading sections in the west would indicate that the crop was secured in the best possible condition, and that the crop in the West and the Northwest in a general way might safely Northwest in a general way might safely be said to be better than last year in every respect, and especially as regards color. The cream of the crop is expected from Wisconsin, where barley is exceptionally fine, and Iowa next. In Minnesota the average yield per acre will be about 75 per cent. of last year, but this will be fully made up by the increased acreage, and from portions of the state where the crop was a failure last year. The quality will vary greatly from choice to poor, but the bulk will be sound malting barley of fair color and weight. The reports from this state are generally unsatisfactory, both in quality and yield, and a large percentage is unfit for malting. The lake shore, where the best barley comes from, shows up poor the best barley comes from, shows up poor —nearly all light weight and only half a crop. Canada reports in per cent, of a crop, the yield short about 15 per cent, with berry and color better than last year,

Foronto Live Stock Market - Intere There were received at the western stock rards last week 1,936 cattle, 2,165 sheep and ambe and 331 hogs. The supply was more sheep and lambs, 300 hogs and 50 calves. Notwithstanding the large offerings Tues day the market was firm, and there was an active trade doing in all lines. Prices were well maintained, and in some instanng of the market there was an active demand, and not a little of the stock was picked up at once. Later things were not so active, but at this stage everything good had been taken, and there was no falling off in values. It has been a matter of comment lately that the market has held up so well under the large supplies that have come upon it, but the active buying of one or two local desiers and a good outside demand have undoubtedly contributed to this result. As a matter of fact there is more business being done in this market than in Mon'roal, and it may be noted that very little stock has gone from here to Montreal to be sold, the local demand usu-ally taking up all that comes in. There is still complaint regarding the quality of the cattle that are offered for eale on this market, and this applies mostly to the export stock that comes forward. It is undoubtedly true that very many, in fact the majority, of the cattle that are sent in here to be sold for export to the old country are not in a finished condition, and therefore bring lower prices than they otherwise would realize, besides losing money to exporters in the English markets. It is the

porters in the English markets. It is the general complaint that the farmers do not fully feed their stock before emding them into this market to be sold, and hence arises the cry that there is no really well finished stock to send forward to the old country. There is this to be said, however, the very best beeves are hought up in the country and do not touch this market at all. Exporters are continually purchasing all. Exporters are continually purchasing in the country and pick up the best stock there, paying prices probably relatively lower than cculd be realized here. Laying aside this argument it appears to be a fact that the farmers are parting with their stuff so readily that they do not give their stock time to get into condition, and it is a question whether they would not realize more by holding it till later in the season. Expert cattle and stockers-There wa quite active buying in both these lines and prices were well-maintained, stocker being, if anything, firmer than last week The fact that there are a larger number of steamers than usual advertised to sail this week, and consequently more space to fill beloed the market, as shippers were buy ing freely in order to take all the space and freights were also quoted slightly easier. The most of the buying of fat ex port stock was done by one firm, althoug

port stock was done by one firm, although other local men went into the market prepared to purchase where opportunity offered. Not a great many really choice export stuff was on sale, and such would have brought 5c, per lb., but the majority of the sales were made at 43 to 45 for fair to good loads, and 1 to 45c, per lb. for medium stock. There was an active sale for stockers, and the prices paid were rather better. The Montreal syndicate, represented by Mr. John Rogers, purchased about 300 head to day, and Mr. John Rogers shipped out 350 head of stockers to night. Outside of the Montreal buying there was a good local demand, and all the stock offering went off weil. Prices for fair to good quality ranged from 3 to 35c, per lb., and 35c, was readily paid for choice stock. One car of stockers was bought to be shipped to Owen Sound. Representative sales were:
