The plan is to build a railway castward from Quebec Rio miles to St. Charles Hey on the Labrador coast, from which point large steamships are expected to make the voyage to Milford Haven, in Wales, in three and a half days. By this route it is contended that passengers and perishable freight can be carried from Chicago to London inside of seven days. It is proposed by the company, which calls large share of attention here.
