It will be seen by the attached statement marked "A" that the total amount in quired for the current year's expenses is \$25,881 15; but this amount includes the deficit of 1880, which is \$6,850 91. Taking away the deficit leaves a balance of \$10,024 94 to be previded for. The total amount required by the echocle is \$13,270, making in all \$30,151 95; but it must be remembered that the amount of \$19,745 received from the country as the town's proportion of Spot act fines, for which an injunction has been insued prohiting the present use of that money.


