The Duty on Lumber and Logs. There is a prospect of getting the duty apon lumber entering the United States entirely removed, provided the Dominion government will at once abolish the export duty on logs. So long as the latter duty is maintained the lumber manufacturers of the United States are afforded some grounds for demanding retaliation by congress against Canadian lumber, and therefore our lumber merchants should take steps to get the export duty wiped out immediately. A Toronto tory paper urges the federal government to stick to its duty on logs, alleging that what the Yankees want is "to obtain the raw material and secure for their own mills the profit of manufacturing it." The same paper adds that the export duty on logs paper adds that the export duty on logs paper adds that the export duty on logs prevents American mill owners from taking Canadian logs and cutting them in their own mills, and secure the profit of turning these logs into lumber for our own manufacturers. But the federal government have formally agreed to sholish the export duty upon logs provided the Americans reduce their lumber duty to one dollar per thousand feet—thus confessing that even a reduction of the American duty to that figure would be of American duty to that figure would be of more advantage to the country than an export duty on logs. The only effect of the export duty in Canada is to depreciate the value of timber limits in the hands of provincial governments and private individuals, while it has given the American lumber manufacturers an excuse for asking congress to increase the duty upon Canadian lumber. - [Ottawa Free Press.
