The Waterworks Contract. The waterworks contract with William & Co. of New York was carefully considered at a joint meeting of the council and board of trade Friday evening. Mayor Smith occupied the chair, and Mr. G. H. Hopkins, town solicitor, who has given very close attention to the matter, read the contract clause by clause, and suggested some desirable amendments. The question of sources of supply, sizes of pipes, etc., were carefully discussed, and satisfactory conclusions arrived at. The contract requires the company to sink test wells to a depth of 100 feet, and if a suitable supply is not obtained then recourse may be had to the sources of water in the country. The water for domestic purposes must stand the test of the health, so the company runs the risk on that score.

The New Grain Elevator. Our citizens not having taken advantage of the opportunity offered them to form a joint stock company in connection with the proposed elevator, Messrs. Dundas & Fyvalde Bros., with characteristic energy, have decided to go on with the scheme unaided, and men are now working on a large stone building for the elevator, in the east ward, will be raised and moved the length of itself to the east, occupying the site of the old stable, owned by Mr. Baker, and on the lot then left vacant an elevator 32x60 ft. in size and 100 ft. in height will be erected. Its capacity will be 60,000 bushels. The foundations will be completed this fall.

Accidents. -Tuesday last as Mr. Jas. Hamilton (of Hamilton's carriage works), was passing a piece of timber through the buzz planer the shavings commenced to block the machine, and in trying to push them out a couple of his fingers were badly cut and lacerated.

-Wednesday morning a serious accident happened Mr. D. Houlahan of Lindsay, formerly of Delhi, who has been working on Mr. E. H. Hopkins' farm, west of the town, for some time past. It appears that Houlahan had been engaged in driving manure to the house with a team and wagon and on the return trip the lines got under the pole. Stopping the horses he stepped out on the pole, which came down for the line, when the animal, usually quite steady, became frightened and ran away. Houlahan clung to the pole for some distance but was at length shaken off, and the wagon passed over him, breaking several ribs, and injuring him internally. He was conveyed to the Dominion house, William-st., and medical assistance procured. His injuries are considered very serious.

-Mr. D. Hallinan, freeman in Parkins & Son's shingle mill, met with an unpleasant and somewhat unusual accident on Wednesday. He lives in the east ward, and while engaged in a punt shortly after twelve to his dinner a couple of dynamite charges exploded where the deepening of the river channel is being proceeded with a short distance further down stream. Not having participated from the flying fragments of rock thrown up by the explosion, and Mr. Hallinan was thinking more of the dinner that was awaiting him than looking out for stray missiles. Suddenly a stone about the size of a brick descended upon the muscle of his arm and this was followed immediately after by a smaller one, which struck him on the head. The two blows rendered him nearly insensible, and some one who conveyed him home, where he soon recovered under medical care.
