The local grain dealers laugh the doctrine to scorn; and one who advanced the prices last week announces his intention to buy no more if the McKinley bill goes into operation October 1st. Intelligent and fair-minded farmers who think and study out the question for themselves and who are not in party bindage have no doubt as to the effect of the McKinley tax. They believe that it will be practically prohibitory, that whatever may be the price in the American market the Canadian farmer will have to take that price less the cost of getting the barley there, and that cost has been alarmingly increased by the McKinley toll.
