SOUTH VICTORIA BY-ELECTION. It seems probable that the Ottawa administration fears the consequences of a simple discussion in South Victoria and has prepared plans to rush on the by-election on the shortest possible notice. The Tory convention is to meet in Lindsay on Saturday, October 11th, and the generally well-informed Ottawa correspondent of the Mail telegraphs that the election will take place on the 11th October.

The reform electors of the riding must be on the alert for a short contest. The reform convention has been called for Monday, October 6th, in Hamilton's hall, Lindsay. Our friends in Emily and Verulam are taking steps to have delegates elected for the convention. In the other portions of the riding the delegates elected for the west riding convention have a mandate for the south riding as well.
