H. Dumble last Thursday morning. His honor said the prisoner had been guilty of a very bad offence and had shown a bravado that qui'e a contrast to the majority of services was actoniching. He was undoubtedly a boy of had proclivities, yet the magistrate felt that to send to prison a lad of his ten-der age would simply confirm him in crime. If he was sent to the reformatory at Penetanguishene for five years, his morals might not be improved when he came out. The magletrate said he would have preferred to send him to 'h i tadustrial school at Mimico, but found that this could not be done without expense to the municipal

ity, as the guvernment of Canada had made no provision for it. Lader all the circumstances his honor thought the best thing that could be done was to give the boy a severe dogging. He said if Smith's father would give the boy 21 lashes on the bare back with a birch gad and inflict punishment conscientionaly and to the estisfaction of the court he would not send the boy to the reformatory. The father readily accept-ed the magistrate's suggestion, and accordingly, in the police cells below, in the presence of the chief constable, the boy culprit was severely flogged by his father. Each stroke of the gad left a livil welt upon the back of the boy, who cried with the pain. 

The grand dam of Clear Grit, jr., was by the imported stallion, England's Hanner, imported by John Peck of Varna, in 1870. He was got by that famous English horse Capt. Willi ms dam by Veature; he by Ebor. England's Banner traces back to some of the most famous turf performers in England.

The names given above are sufficient to show that Clear Grit, Jr., is descended from the best strains of tretting and theroughbred blood to be found in the stud books, and an examination of himself will show that he does no discredit to his progenitors.
