THE BENWELL MURDER. An Important Statement from Denwell's Brother-No Thinks Direball End a

Young Henwell left Woodstock Monday night for New York, where he will stay for a few days and then take the steamer for England. Before he left for New York, strange to say, he confirmed to some extent what was contained in the letter published in the Mail. In an interview with a Mail reporter, he said :- "No, I am not likely to come to Canada again, though this is a fine country. I have not allowed mgerif, through the death of my brother, to form a prejudicial opinion of the people here of of the Dominion. You see my brother might have been murdered in Anstralia. New Zusland of anywhere class instead of Canada. And you may say I have only the kindling featings towards. have only the kindles feelings towards the recopie of Woodstock."
"Have you heard from your father

"No, I have no: I intended sailing oome time ago, and wrote to that effect, consequently he has been expecting me back by every ship. I will cable him from New York to morrow that I am on my way home. Some friends were interesting themselves in my behalf, with a view of securing me a situation here, but no hing apparently effered itself, so I decided to return to England."

Butchers' cattle—Good butchers' stock was scarce and in demand at firm prices. Good loads brought 33c per lb, which was generally about the highest price, although for extra single animals to was paid. Medium stock was quoted at 3½ to 3½ per lb, and inferior at 2½ to 3c, Among the transactions were: 8 cattle, 950 lbs, at \$3.75 per cwt; 22 do, 875 lbs, at \$31 per head; 20 do, 1,025 lbs, at \$38 per head; 24 do, 875 lbs, at \$38 per head; 6 do, 1,015 lbs, at \$33 50 per head; 10 do, 900 lbs, at \$3.32½ per cwt; 17 do, 875 lbs, at \$3 per cwt; 21 do, 950 lbs, at \$3.50 per cwt; 12 do, 1,000 lbs, at \$3.60 per cwt; 21 do, 950 lbs, at \$3.50 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs—A dragging trade only is doing in export sheep, yet the few that come forward are being taken up at 4 to 44c per lb. Lambs were not so plentiful, and being in very fair request prices were firmer, ranging from \$3 50 to \$4 25 each. Some sales were: 129 sheep, 148 lbs, at 44c per lb; 19 do, 155 lbs at \$5 each; 24 do, 152 lbs, at \$6 each; 21 do, 80 lbs, at \$3.75 each; 6 do, 85 lbs, at \$4 each.

Calves—Very few calves of any kind are coming in, yet there was a moderate enquiry for good stock Tuesday at \$5 to \$3 each, and in some instances the demand could not be filled.

Milk cows and springers—For good milkers the demand is quite good, but offerings are coming forward only slowly. Good milkers the demand is quite good, but offerings are coming forward only slowly. Good milkers bring \$30 to \$45, and inferior \$25 to \$28 each. Springers for export are being enquired for at \$35 to \$50 each.

Hogs—In view both of the very large receipts and the low quality of the offerings Tuesday the market was in a weak condition, and most of the sales were made at around it to 15c per lb for mixed lots. Stores are not wanted at all.

Terente Street Market.

Receipts of grain on the street to-day were fair and prices unchanged. Barley steady, with sales of 3.000 bushels at 52c to 61c. Wheat firm; 300 bushels relling at 95c for fall, 93b for red winter, 85c to 90c for spring, and 75c for goose. Oats firmer. 300 bushels selling at 40b, to 43jc. Peas sold at 63 to 64c for 100 bushels, and a load of rye at 58c. Hay in fair supply and steady, there being 30 loads sold at 88 to 310 per ton. A few loads of straw sold at 38 to 39.50 a ton. Dressed hogs easier, selling at \$5.25 to \$5.90.—
