A Sad and Fatal Accident Friday evening last it was reported in town that Edward Roche, son of Mr. Patrick Roche of Ope, one of the old and respected residents of the township, had been run over by a wagon and dangerously injured, and much regret was expressed, as the young man was well known by many of our citizens. The rumor was verified Saturday when the meagre details of the accident were learned. It appears that the young man left his own farm for the town about four o'clock with a load of 35 or 35 begs of barley. Just how the unfortunate accident occurred is not known, but it is surmised that a bag or two dislodged owing to the wagon striking a stone or other obstruction, and that Roche, in endeavoring to save them from falling, was thrown in front of the wheels, one of which passed over his chest and the other over his stomach. The horses—young animals—started to run away, and Mr. John Downey, who was working in a field near by, but who had not witnessed the accident, started for the road to go in pursuit, when hearing moens he turned back and discovered poor Roche lying in the road. Assistance was a once summoned and he was couried to his own home, where everything that medical skill could accompileh was done, but without avail; the internal injuries were of too serious a nature to permit of his railying, and he passed away Tuesday evening..... The deceased was only 28 years of age, and was not married.
