GERSHON BULL'S DISTRESSING DEATH.—
The brief item in THE Post last week describing the distressing socident that resulted in the lamented death of Gershon resulted in the lamented death of Gershon Bull was incomplete and not correct in stating that the deceased lost his self-command. The well Mr. Bull was cleaning out was on the roadside in the village and was used by the hotel on the Brock side. It was forty-one feet deep and was a very old well. Mr. Bull was cleaning it out, and about 11.30 a. m. Wednesday when the curving at the bottom gave way from the pressure of wet earth on the outside of it, forming a space something like the letter V. s heavy iron about the size of a wagon Buil in the corner by one shoulder, while the other was held fast by the planks. His fast were also fast between the bucket and curb so that he could not move. He was held in a partly sloping position. It was impossible to draw him out or to help him: seif. Every possible effort was made to extricate him, the water being kept down as long as possible. He was quite sensible as long as possible. In about four hours the water and sand rose over his head and he was drowned. Immediately as many as could possibly work in the space commenced to remove the loose earth, and after twenty-six hours hard work the body was recovered.
