That "Important Warning." To the Public. In last week's issue of the Post and Warbler appeared a communication or advertisement from Mr. D. Smart under the above heading, in which I am accused by him of having made misrepresentations to Mr. Geo. Gertley regarding his organs.

In reply to the accusation I would simply say that Mr. Smart has published what he knew at the time to be a falsehood, as I intend to show the public. The following statement from Mr. Gertley will show how untrue Mr. Smart's statements are, and how unworthy he is of notice.

MR. GERTLEY'S STATEMENT. To Mr. W. W. Logan, I positively deny that I told Mr. Smart that you said there was any impropriety in his organs or made insinuations to that effect.

I received my information from another source regarding lies and misrepresentations on organs. I also deny having said that I preferred his organ to yours, for you never had an organ at my house nor showed one to me.

I wrote to the company for which Smart is agent, and at his request gave him the reply I received with the privilege of publishing it for a different purpose. Had I known that he was going to write such an article I would have had nothing to do with him. I have much pleasure in making this statement, in order that the public may know that I had nothing to do with the article written by Smart.

GEORGE GERTLEY. The above statement needs no comment and brands my accuser as an unreliable man. The Dominion organ, for which I am agent, is known the world over, and needs but live agents and legitimate means to effect sales. The trouble is that Mr. Smart cannot get these instruments, and the one he is agent for will not sell where the Dominion has been shown. For instance, Mr. Smart placed an organ in Mr. McMullen's, near Mr. Gertley's, and a Dominion organ was put beside it by me. It was as one conceded by competent judges, a music teacher among others, that the Dominion was by far the best instrument. Mr. Smart becoming a little nettled at this, proposed to bring an organ of another make, which he said would beat the Dominion. He placed instrument No. 2 beside the Dominion, the result being that the Dominion, the result being that the Dominion organ and allowed the other two to be taken away. A similar case between the very same make of organs took place at the house of Mr. John Dames, Mariposa, and the result was exactly the same. I might enumerate several other instances of the kind, but do not think it necessary at present.

Mr. Smart in his communication says, "I do not complain of honest competition." I will now relate an instance of Mr. Smart's style of "honest competition." Mr. Robert Moore, residing near Mt. Hope, who purchased from me a Dominion organ, relates the following facts: "I was told by you that the organ I purchased contained two sets of reeds. Some days after the organ was delivered at my house D. Smart called to see it. When he looked at it he told me I was sold, and tried to make me believe that the organ did not contain two sets of reeds. He opened the back of the organ and looked at it; after closing it up he again came to the front of the organ, pulled some of the stops, and said they were useless. He said the organ was a second-hand one, and only cost \$4, and that he could give me a new one like it for \$60. He said Mr. Logan had too much profit on his organs, a great deal more than he (Smart) had, as Logan paid cash for his instruments and he did not. Not knowing whether to believe Smart's statements I called and told you what had passed, and you said that you would give \$100 if I would bring Mr. Smart to your face and get him to say he could prove what he said about the reeds. I went to Smart and tried to prove him before you. He pretended to be in a hurry, and started down street. You told me to wait until he returned and try him again. I did so, but he refused to meet you. The organ was not opened at the back by any person except Smart from the time you left it in my house until you and another person came to see what was wrong with it, when it was found that the statement belonging to the stop which sets on the back

of reeds had been displaced, thus destroying the effect of said set of reeds. I am positively satisfied that the instrument is what you represented it to be. The stop referred to above could not be displaced except by removing the back and prying on it intentionally. Further, it was all right, and in good order when I left it in Mr. Moore's house. Notwithstanding Mr. Smart's statement to the contrary, the organ did contain two full sets of reeds, and by placing the substitute lower in position the stoppered properly on the back set of reeds. I could relate many other instances of Mr. Smart's trickery, and this is the man who has cheek enough to say he would not complain of "honest competition." Every thing stated here is a fact, and I might also add that I have never yet said behind Mr. Smart's back what I would not say so readily to his face.
