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Police Court

Thursday, Sept. 7th.—Joseph Hetherington, Robert Lewis, Jr. and Harry Callow were charged with malicious injury to a car at the Midland station on Sunday, the 29th inst., by breaking a window with stones. They pleaded not guilty, and after being some evidence the case was adjourned till Sept. 8th. George Henderson was brought up on warrant and charged with stealing a letter containing five dollars from the office of the Midland R. R. station on the 24th inst. The evidence for the prosecution based a strong case of presumption against the prisoner and the magistrate committed him for trial.

Friday, Sept. 1st.—Two summary cases were at the desire of the health officer further adjourned till Sept. 15th. The further investigation against Joseph Hetherington and Robert McLean for stealing books from Hetherington's boat-house was postponed till the 8th inst. Tuesday, September 5th.—Midland Railway and others.—In this case the counsel for complainants stated that the company did not desire to press the matter further and the case might be dismissed. It was dismissed accordingly. The two boys Irwin and Callow were then arraigned on the charge of stealing some oranges and bottles of beer from the freight house at the Union station about three weeks since. They pleaded to be tried by jury. On conclusion of the evidence in support of the charge which consisted chiefly of voluntary statements of admissions made by the boys to other parties, they were committed for trial. Edward Edmonds was accused by Orin Clark with assisting him and using threatening language towards him. On the case being called, Edmonds said he was willing to withdraw his complaint on defendant's paying the costs and finding arrears to keep the peace, which defendant forthwith did and the case was dismissed.

Wednesday, Sept. 6th.—Three other charges against the boys Hetherington, Irwin and Callow, for petty larceny for stealing things from the freight house at the Midland R. R. station were allowed to drop and the boys were discharged from custody so far as those charges were concerned. George McTavish for lying drunk on the sidewalk was fined \$5 and costs of one week. The fine was paid. The case against Hetherington and McLean for breaking into Hetherington's boat-house was again adjourned pending the apprehension of the boy McTavish, who had broken bail and did not attend.

Logan's Veracity Insulted. Logan in his letter of the 31st inst. complains of an insult offered to his veracity. If he has any veracity it might justly be insulted by the unprincipled acts he has been guilty of committing. As the public can see he has not been able in a single instance to clear himself of the charge that I still hold against him, viz: that of speaking misstatements to the public in regard to the instruments I offer for sale. Logan does in his last letter try to screen himself by creeping under another statement made by Mr. Gertley, but if Mr. Gertley has any veracity he should clear Logan of speaking the misstatements above named. I have failed to see it. Even Logan himself has not denied that he did insinuate to a member of Mr. Gertley's family that he did not pay cash for my instruments and that the company held a claim on them. If any person doubts my authority for making these charges upon Logan, I can give them satisfactory evidence by calling at my shop on Kent st. in regard to the falsehoods published about the stop being displaced in Mr. Moore's organ why did not Logan show Mr. Moore that the stop was displaced? Mr. Moore says he does not know of any stop ever being displaced and I am confident there never was a stop displaced. But that was only a sample of Logan's insinuations.

He in his last letter states that he can back anything he has said regarding me or my organs. The letter from the Bell Company published below, also the letter from the Kern Co. steadily published will show the public how much either his word or his backing is worth. I publish Mr. Bell's letter here: Sir.—In reference to the letter for D. Smart we would say that Mr. Smart has invariably paid us for our organs within thirty days.
