THE GRISTING TOLL.

A correspondent elsewhere writes us regarding complaints which he says are being made respecting the toll charged for gristing at the Lindsay grist mill.

As to the law on the subject we find in cap. 113, sec. 1, R. P. O., that "no owner or occupier of a mill nor any person in his employ shall demand or take as toll a greater proportion of any grain brought to him to be ground and bolted than one-twelfth part thereof for grinding the same under a penalty of forty dollars for each offense."

Perhaps the parties who complain to our correspondent are more to blame in the matter than anyone else by bringing in grain of poor quality to grind. It may also be dirty and require considerable attention in cleaning or preparing before it can be put through the mill.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

CHIEF Justice Wood, of Winnipeg, died of apoplexy on Saturday. Deep regret is felt in Winnipeg at his sudden and unexpected death.

On the occasion of the opening of the new glass factory at Toronto, a champagne luncheon was served on the top of the chimney, a distance of 160 feet from the ground. The space on top was railed in, and accommodated sixteen persons.

DR. SLAVEN, the Conservative candidate for East Simcoe, believes that the head of our educational system should be in a position free from political partisanship, so that his acts may be criticized freely by both sides of the House.

It is said that a deputation from the Evangelical churches of Ontario will wait on Attorney-General Mowat on the 24th inst., in reference to introducing the Bible into the public schools of the province.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER, Minister of Railways and Canals, has left Ottawa for the west. He intends to travel over the entire line of the C. P. R. as far as construction has been completed, and will make a personal inspection of the road.

THE Canadian: The Globe professes to be alarmed for the integrity of the Crooks Act, and characterizes its proposed repeal as a social danger.

MR. MOWAT'S deals with the license question conclusively:—"The Conservative party does not propose to interfere with the Crooks Act so far as it limits the number of licenses, or restricts the sale of liquor in unlicensed houses; at the same time the party holds that the control of the traffic should be vested, not in the Government, but in the people through their municipalities."

He says that in many respects educationalists acknowledge the Manitoba system to be in advance of that of Ontario, and he alleges that one point in which Manitoba surpasses Ontario is in having a non-political Superintendent of Education instead of a Minister of Education.

THE Montreal Star, independent, does not think the Reform party has gained since the death of the Hon. George Brown. "When" it says, "the statute in honor of the Hon. George Brown is erected, it will be in memory of a man who had a great deal of respect from both political parties. COMMERCIAL.

THE MARKET. Local deliveries of grain during the past week have been somewhat heavier, especially in barley. Grain can scarcely be said to be moving yet to any extent, however. Prices for both wheat and barley have not materially changed.

BRITISH CATTLE MARKET.

The supplies of fat cattle, both in Edinburgh and Glasgow markets, have neither been so large nor nearly so good quality this as last week. At the latter market there was the worst show of the season, there being very few choice animals on offer. The trade has been fairly good, but secondary and inferior qualities were if anything, cheaper.

THE BRITISH GRAIN TRADE.

THE Mark Lane Express, in its review of the grain trade of the past week, says: The sowing of the 1893 crop is proceeding satisfactorily. The tendency of trade has been continually downward. There was an apparent steadiness at the close, but the varied quality of native offerings of wheat compares badly with foreign wheat, which is extremely depressed.

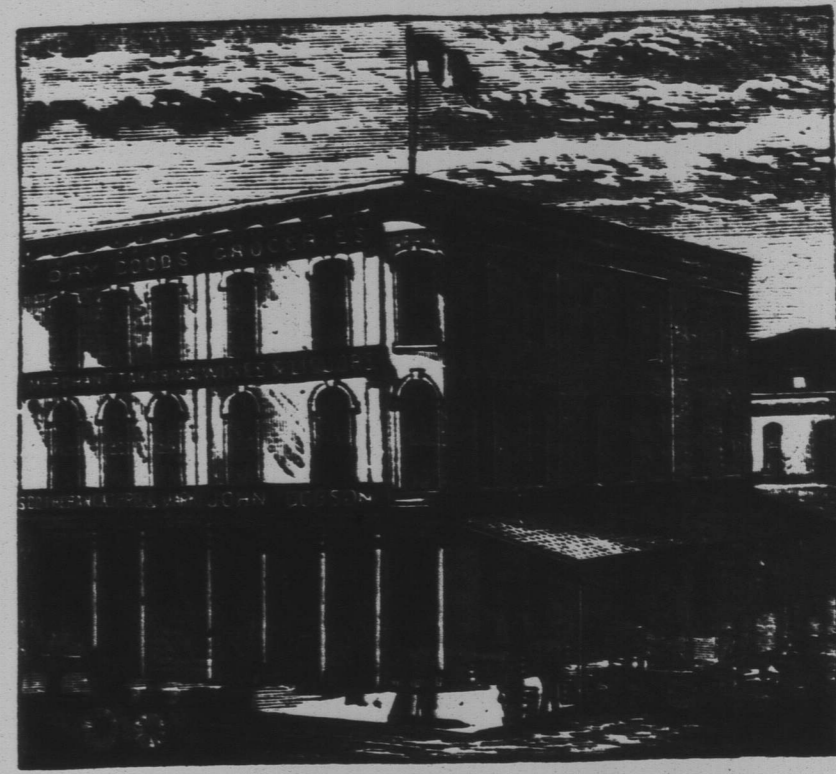
