Winters, Kerth, Ross, Morrison, Brady, Brooks and Graham. Absent: Hurley and Walker. The minutes of the previous meeting read and confirmed.

In the absence of the mayor the reeve occupied the chair.

GOWSETT STOATTONS

A communication was received from Messrs. M. O'Grady and Mr. O'Connor, asking the council to grant them a license for a bowling alley, promising to conduct such alley in an orderly manner.

In the absence of the chairman of the finance committee, Mr. O'Leary introduced the report of the finance committee, recommending the payment of several accounts, which was adopted.

THE WATER WORKS.

Mr. Winters, on behalf of the fire and water committee, stated that they being unable to report anything definite in regard to the present state of the waterworks they had deferred making any report at present. The committee had looked into the matter and found that the lowness of the water had a great deal to do with the trouble, it being one foot and a half lower at the time of the late fire than usual. They also thought there was a defection in the priming of the pumps. They thought also that the present power for pumping the water was too small to force the wheel as it should be forced. They found everything all right in the captain's department. As soon at Mr. Makins finished his work they would report promptly.

Mr. O'Leary said that as the committee appointed to investigate the charges against chief constable Smart had rendered their decision there was no further use for them, and ought to be relieved. The committee had been waiting to get evidence from the late police magistrate, but now] that death had overtaken him

it. - Carried. Mr. Melville moved that the application of Messrs. M. O'Grady and Mr. O'Connor for license to operate a bowling alley be granted. - Carried.

Mored by Mr. O'Leary, seconded by Mr. Keith, that by-law 371, being a bylaw to authorize the improvement and enlargement of the town hall and the leasing of the same, be now read a first time. - Carried.

Mr. O'Leary moved the council into committee of the whole, Mr. Winters in the chair, and the blanks were filled leasing the town hall to Mr. Bradburn for 10 years at \$100 per year, with the privilege of renewing said lease if agreeable to both parties at the expiration of that period.
