The men will be furnished with the most approved descriptions of cork jackets, and the boat will have life-boats attached to it. The municipality of Cobourg has agreed to provide a suitable building, where the life-boat can be kept ready for service at any moment.

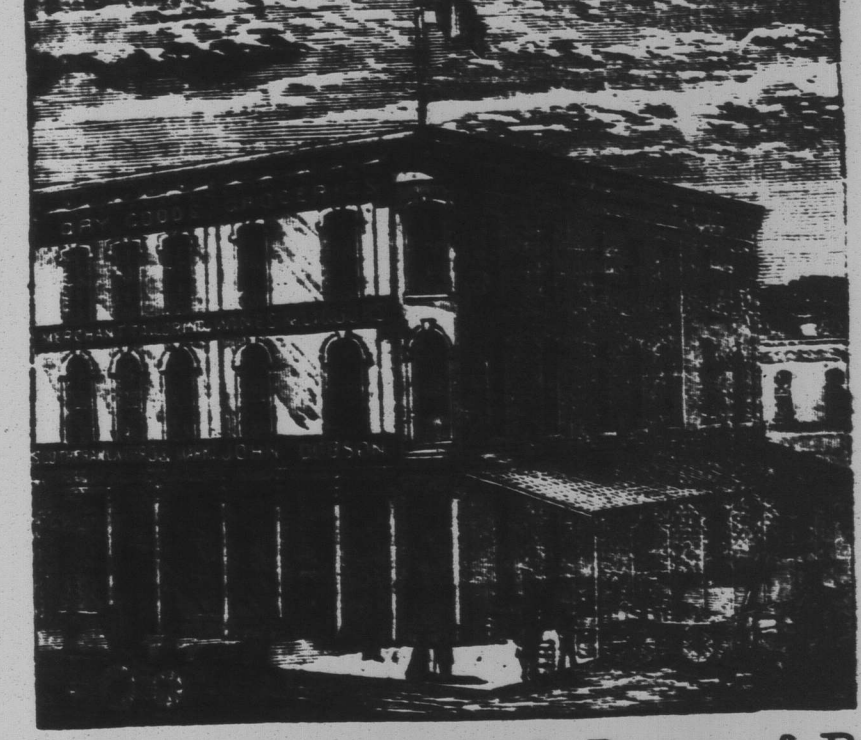
