Intelligent men are beginning to see the folly of increasing the size of the farm at the expense of its culture. A few see what multitudes could never be brought to realize, that it is better to raise 500 bushels of wheat on 10 acres rather than on 50. The latter is the practice by the majority of farmers in some whole districts, especially where the land is let to tenants. It is one of the blessings connected with the high price of labor that it forces the farmer to economize the time of his men and teams by cutting short the number of acres plowed, harrowed and harvested, and increasing the fertility of the fewer acres gone over. One man and one team may thus be made to answer when 10 acres are put into wheat, where four men and four teams would be necessary to put in 50 acres. By sowing clover on a heavily manured field the product is enormous. The aftermath turned under and the surface harrowed and rolled and hand harrowed and well coated with manure will insure a heavy crop of wheat. Seed again with clover and turn under after cutting one crop of clover, and manure again and sow to wheat. Large yields will be certain and to increase from year to year until 50 bushels will be as common to the acre as five are now. A man can afford, perhaps, to thus bring up 10, if not 10, 5, or 1 acre, but when 50 acres are to be thus treated he is either a bold, wealthy or enterprising man who will dare attempt

As a rule there is for more danger from under-feeding than from over-feeding fowls, though there are still many breeders who overfeed their birds, and then wonder why they do not lay so well or. keep healthy. All good things when used or carried to excess become injurious and decidedly objectionable, and even the best of grain and other food is no exe ption to this positive rule. Over-feeding causes many ailments which are difficult to overcome, while it causes an undue secretion of fat on the ovaries of the laying hens, thus entirely vetoing the egg supply. Leg weakness, breaking down and other troubles arise principally from over-feeding, while overfed fowls are much more liable to disease and disorders than are birds fed properly; and when the over-fat birds are attacked they sel-
