

CHEESE FACTORY. - The cheese factory

here closed the last day of September, operated, as there is no doubt had there been a sufficient supply of milk for October the results would have been better. The season was divided into parts, from 1st June to 15th July, and for the latter date to 20th September. All the cheese made to 15th July being sold at one time the average was struck to that date, and again at the close of the season. For the first part of the season the amount of milk received was 96,055 lbs., c made 6,542 lbs., being 10 1-10 milk to one lb. of cheese. Fo part of the season 138,892 amount realized for cheese after include the drawing of the milk to factory, as some of the patrons drew theil own and others hired it done. For the entire season the average value of milk delivered at the factory realized a trifle over 8 mills per lb.
