QUARRY.—Verulam council met on Tuesday afternoon to consider a proposal of Messrs. Walters and McNeely to buy the stone in the east boundary allowance between Roboaygon and Verulam. The proposal was accepted at 30c. per cord. The village council met in the evening, and on consideration passed a by-law to a similar effect. Between four and five hundred cords of dressed stone are required, which will be prepared ready for the opening of navigation.—Independent.

REPLY POST CARDS.—For the convenience of correspondents by post cards within the Dominion, a double post card has been prepared and is now ready for issue, which will afford to the original sender of this form of cards the means of sending with his communication a blank prepared post-card to be used in reply. Each half of the double card will bear one cent postage stamp impressed thereon in prepayment. The ordinary post card regulations will apply to these reply cards, both when originally posted, and with respect to the reply half when re-posted. The reply or double post cards will be issued at two cents each, and are to be sold to the public at that rate by post-masters and stamp vendors. Canada reply post cards to be used in correspondence with the United Kingdom, will also be supplied at an early date, and other post cards of this description, originating in the United Kingdom and bearing the improved postage stamp thereon on both halves, have been prepared. Here by mail, the reply half may be re-posted in Canada for postage to an address in the United Kingdom, or a reverse post card, and may be forwarded to destinations without requiring the addition of any Canada postage or other postage property in Canada.

At Seabird Bluff, Fraser River, B. C., Friday, a blast was let off at a rock cut and a piece of rock, thrown a considerable distance, struck a Chinaman, cutting his head completely off. Three of the same gang started for Miller, toemen of the rock work, and he had to run for his life. Finding himself hotly pursued, he ran into the river, and was followed some distance in the water by the Chinaman, whilst others remained on the bank throwing stones at him. At this crisis John Garvin appeared in a boat, and forgetting all danger to himself, amid a shower of stones reached Miller, helped him into the boat and started for Mara Island. Two shots were fired from the Chinaman on the bank. The balls struck the water close to the boat. Finally the boat reached the island and landed Miller, who remained there two days, when he went to Yale. Garvin having headed his boat up the river was followed two miles by an excited mob, but got away.
