WHITEWASH.—Whitewash is one of the most valuable articles in the world when properly applied. It not only prevents the decay of wood, but conduces greatly to the healthfulness of all buildings, whether of wood or stone. Out-buildings and fences, when not painted, should be supplied unce or twice a year with a good stone. Out-buildings and fences, when not painted, should be supplied oace or twice a year with a good coat of whitewash, which should be prepared in the following way. Take a clean, water-tight barrel, or other suitable cask, and put into it a half bushel of lime. Slack it, by pouring water over it boiling hot, and in sufficient quantity to cover it five method as deep, and stir it briskly till thoroughly slackened. When the slacking has been thoroughly effected, dissolve it in water, and add two pounds of sulphite of zine and one of common salt; these will cause the wash to harden and prevent its cracking, which gives an unseemly appearance to the work. 
