Early Made Hay.

The practice of beginning to cut the grasses as soon as they are fairly in blossom is rapidly gaining favor. This favored time comes to many fields in this latitude, from the middle to the last of June. With the improved implements of hay-making —the horse-mower, rake and tedder, it is not difficult now for the farmer to gather all his hay crop at the time when it makes the most nutritious not give so heavy a yield of hay to the acre at one cutting, and the same bulk will not weigh so much as the grass cured two or three weeks later. But very careful experiments show that the hay thus treated is much more nutritious; it is relished better by all kinds of neat stock, and nothing is left in the manger. 




