The Prussians, on the previous evening, had driven the French from the village of Ladon Champs, and had established four posts in St. Remy Petite and Grande, Lapes and Maxe. Bazaine, under cover of a thick fog advanced his under cover of a thick fog advanced his troops, and commenced an attack for the recovery of Ladon Champs. Having engaged the Prussian artillery he made a dash for Petites, and Grandes Lapes, annihilating the foreposts, and throwing great masses of men on their supports.
