

The New York Sun has an exalted opinion of the Hon. Mr. Macdonald, who is perhaps the ablest among the "British Commissioners." The Sun after thus complimenting the Dominion Premier, goes on to give him a very unnecessary piece of advice:—"He will of course advocate the interests of Canada not alone on the question of the fisheries, the free navigation of the St. Lawrence, and indemnity for damages from French raids, but also in regard to the desired new treaty for reciprocal trade between the United States and the North American Provinces. But even here, where his people are deeply interested, his motto will do well to remember that he is not negotiating for the present merely, and that while nothing can be gained by obstinately insisting upon extreme views much may be lost by attempts to hinder or greatly to postpone that which is inevitable." The Sun goes further:—"There is no member of the Commission whose future is more intimately concerned in a favourable conclusion to its labours than this eminent Canadian statesman; and we trust that he will be able to rise above local prejudices and temporary designs, and in consideration of the full scope of his remarkable powers to the achievement of a comprehensive and permanent settlement." The Sun's trust is not unfounded. When the Commission meets to discuss the important matters referred to in our contemporary will find the Canadian above merely "local prejudices and local designs" and employing all "his available powers" to effect the desired settlement.
