

Fatal Folly and Attempted Suicide.

A few days ago, while the family were at church, a very lamentable occurrence happened at Babb's house, near Daventry, Northamptonshire, the temporary residence of Mr. William Cundy. A few minutes after 12 o'clock John Atkins, the footman, 26 years old, and Mary Ann Avery, a girl 16 years old, one of the maids, who had been talking together, left the kitchen, the latter went into the parlour, and the former into the parlour. The two were on the most friendly terms, the maid being devotedly attached to the girl. A few minutes after they had left the parlour the butler heard them laughing in the kitchen, their laughter being immediately followed by the report of a gun. He ran into the kitchen, and as he entered the girl was falling on the floor, and the footman, who was running round the table to catch her, was cutting out, "I've killed my darling! I've killed my darling!" The butler, Thomas Keefe, went to her and found that she was quite dead, the charge having entered the left breast. In the meantime Atkins left the room, and in a few minutes returned and threw himself on the body of the girl, exclaiming, "I've killed my darling love, and will die with her." It was then perceived he had cut his own throat. Mr. Robert Willis, of 57, Great Cumberland Place, London, who was a guest in the house, found up the throat with medical assistance could be obtained on the previous day Mr. Cundy and Mr. Willis had been out shooting and the charge had been inadvertently left in one of the barrels of the breech-loading double-barrelled gun. The gun had been placed in the kitchen by a helper, who did not know that it was loaded. The young man, who is not dead, says he was unaware of the gun being charged. An inquest was held on the unfortunate girl before Mr. Terry, district coroner, and a verdict of "accidental death" was returned.

A Remarkable Watch.

A remarkable mechanical curiosity has been constructed in London. It is a watch belonging to a member of Parliament and designed and made expressly for him by James Ferguson, Esq., the celebrated London watchmaker. This unique pocket chronometer has a silver dial on which are nine hands, indicating respectively the hours, minutes and seconds, the days of the week; the days of the month, the months of the year. It corrects itself for every 1 month, the day to say, change when they have thirty and thirty-one days; and also corrects itself for leap year. It is so constructed that any slight agitation of the watch, such as the ordinary exercise of walking, winds it up. This may be worn perfectly for years without requiring even to be opened, although it can also be wound by a key in the usual manner. The dial is arranged in five circles, and within the largest, the hour circle, there is a semi-circle showing the moon's age and phases by means of gold hands on a ground of blue steel. At the back of the watch is a gold indicator for ascertaining the time in the dark by touch. The completion of the mechanism may be imagined, and yet the watch is of ordinary dimensions and may be conveniently worn in a gentleman's pocket. It cost the sum of three hundred guineas.

A 12-ton gun, worth \$20,000, was recently lost in the Bombay Harbor. The gun, a short time ago, took out from England six new 12-ton guns for the protection of the harbor. As soon as the ship was ready for unloading, suitable tackle was obtained and the gun was hoisted alongside the Jumbo. When the first cannon, well secured, was lowered into the boat, it almost sank her. To save the boatmen, the order was given to re-hoist. The boat happily pulled off a little, for the dingy intended for lowering proved insufficient for raising the mass of metal, and gave way. There was one tremendous splash, and the lost was seen of the 12-ton gun. The divers could find no other trace of it than a sort of dimple in the mud where it had disappeared. They probed deep, as a doctor would for a bullet, but with no success; and considering the nature of the harbor bottom, some 26 feet of mud in parts, it is scarcely certain that this lost treasure will rest in its present bed for centuries to come.

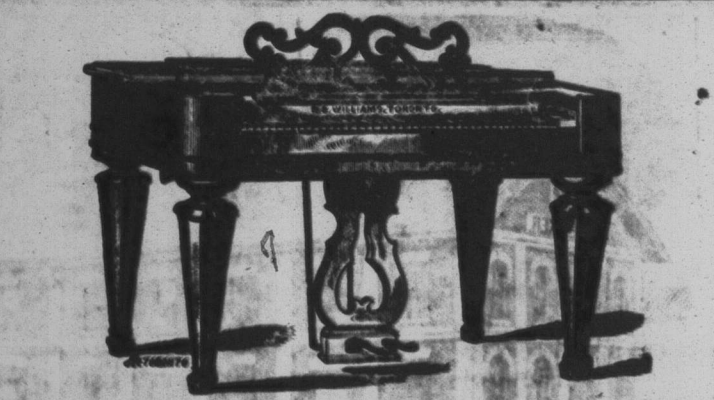
