S. S. Peck's Candidature.
(To the Editor of the Guardian.)

Sir,—I venture to say that all honest
Reformers would much rather that S. S.
Peck had adhered to his expressed inten-
tion of not again offering himself as a
candidate for Parliament, because honest
Reformers know perfectly well that a
candidate who professes to be a Reformer
and who should represent them in Par-
liament, and that a disreputable repre-
sentative brings disgrace on honest and
dignified alike, and particularly so in
these days of ballot voting. One would
have supposed that the fact of this man's
having defrauded the county out of a
large amount of money, and that too at a
time when the county was struggling for
an existence and when every cent col-
lected from the poor settlers should have
been judiciously spent, was sufficient to
enable every honest and intelligent man
to decide that this man at least was un-
worthy of any respect or confidence. I
say that this was not only sufficient, but
that every honest man, whether Re-
former or Conservative, has arrived at
that conclusion. This being the case,
which I think none can deny, is it not
strange and terribly humiliating to the
north riding of Victoria to find that a
meeting so large as that held at Fenelon
Falls should decide that this man was
the proper person to represent them in
Parliament, and when the question was
put by Mr. Wood whether his connection
with the county of Haliburton would
affect his chances of success to be told
that it would not, or in other words that
stealing is no sin in the eyes of Re-
formers.

Oh, but some conscientious representa-
tives of the party of purity will say we
are not sure that Peck stole this money.
Then, sir, it is your bounden duty, and
a duty which you will perform if you are
worthy of the franchise, to use every
means in your power to find out whether
he did or not. Do this conscientiously
and then if you have any doubts in the
matter give Mr. Peck the benefit of your
doubts. Some others say what difference
does it make to us who represents us so
long as he does it well; to these all that
can be said is that Peck is just the man to
be your representative.

Some others say, as was said by a dele-
gate at Fenelon Falls, that Peck had done
more for them than anyone else could
have done because he had more influence
with the Government. Very complimen-
tary to the Government, certainly. A
man who has defrauded the county,
who holds no property in the Province
that can be touched for debt, a man that
should at the present moment be serving
a term in the penitentiary and is getting
it out, to the Government, and then to
tell us that he has more influence with
the Government than any other man
whom you could elect, to admit this and
then tell us that you are a supporter of
such a Government is something that I
should think most men would be ashamed
of.
