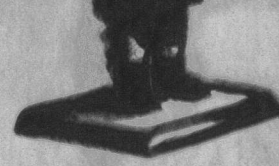

The Victoria Warden

FRIDAY, JANUARY 26, 1883.

County Council.

The January meeting of the county council of Victoria for 1883 took place Tuesday afternoon. The following revenues and equity-receives were present: Messrs. Adam, Bailey, (Emily), Barron, Beaton, Broad, Cameron, Daniel Deacon, Dill, Fairbairn, Fell, Heaslip, Hopkins, Ingle, Junkin, McArthur, McLennan, McMurray, McQuade, Dr. Norris, Parkinson, Smithson and Walker.

The clerk stated that according to the usual custom he was ready to receive nominations for the Wardenship of 1883. Mr. Heaslip stated that as there were several of the gentlemen not present he would move that the council adjourn till ten o'clock to-morrow that they might all be in their places before the nominations were made.

After some slight discussion the clerk declared the motion carried, and the council adjourned till ten o'clock to-morrow.

WEDNESDAY. Council resumed at 10 o'clock. All the members present except Messrs. Parkinson and Junkin. The clerk stated he was now ready for the nominations for warden for 1883, and the following gentlemen were nominated: Mr. N. Heaslip, by Dr. Norris, seconded by Mr. McArthur. Col. Deacon, by Mr. R. Adams, seconded by Mr. Parker.

Mr. J. Daniel, reeve of Fenelon, by Mr. M. Bottum, seconded by Mr. McKechnen. Mr. Heaslip was declared elected by a vote of 16. The newly elected warden was then conducted to the chair by Dr. Norris and Mr. J. McArthur.

Mr. Brown moved, seconded by Mr. Walker, that the following gentlemen be appointed a special committee to nominate the standing committee for the present year: Adam, Dill, Bailey, (Emily), McArthur, Junkin, Daniels, and the mover and seconder.—Carried.

Mr. Hopkins moved, seconded by Mr. Walker, that Messrs. McKibbin and Col. Deacon be auditors of the accounts for the administration of justice.—Carried.

CONTINGENT COMMITTEE. Mr. Hopkins moved, seconded by Mr. Daniels, that Col. Deacon, Dr. Norris and Walker be a committee to superintend contingent expenditures between sessions of this council for the current year.—Carried.

COURT OFFICERS. Dr. Norris moved, seconded by Mr. Broad, that the by-law appointing an auditor and the council go into committee of the whole.

The committee rose and the by-law was read and passed confirming Mr. Jas. McKibbin's nomination. On motion of Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Dill, the report of the special committee to appoint the standing committee was read and the council went into committee thereon, Mr. Brown in the chair.

The committees appointed were as follows: Finance and assessment—Col. Deacon, chairman; Dr. Norris, Messrs. Bailey, (Emily), Adam, Daniel, McArthur, Dill, Bottum, Cameron, Parkinson, Hopkins and Fell.

Roads and bridges—Mr. Daniel, chairman; Messrs. Dill, Fell, McArthur, Adam, Bailey, (Emily), Bailey, (Laxton), McKechnen, McClelland, Parker, Taylor, Broad, Fairbairn, Bottum, Brown and McMurray.

County property—Mr. Hopkins, chairman; Messrs. Ingle, Junkin, McQuade, McKechnen, Bailey, (Emily), Parkinson and Barron.

Education—Dr. Norris, chairman; Messrs. Deacon, Adam, Brown, Dill, Daniel, Ingle, Cameron, Bottum, Parkinson, Fairbairn and McLennan.

Printing—Mr. McLennan, chairman; Messrs. Hopkins, McClelland, Bailey, (Emily), Taylor, Fell, McKechnen, Daniel and Junkin.

Appointments to office—Messrs. Fairbairn, Barron, Walker and McMurray. The committee rose and reported and the report was passed.

On motion of Mr. Hopkins, the report of the by-law appointing auditors was read and passed confirming the appointment of Mr. Jas. McKibbin and Col. Deacon.

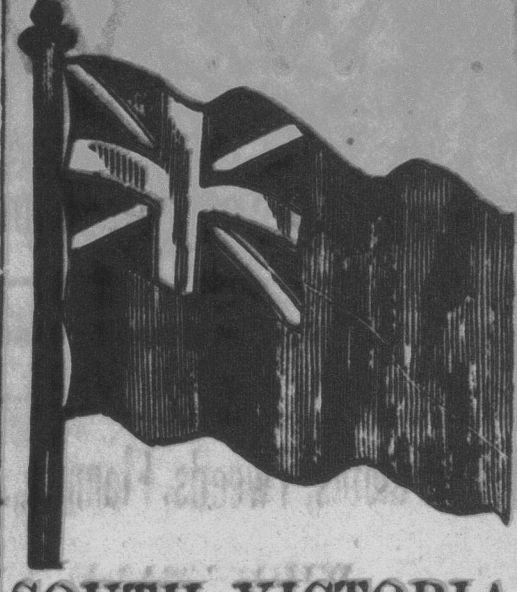
Dr. Norris moved, seconded by Col. Deacon, that the following petition to the Government regarding tree-planting be read and that the council go into committee thereon, as follows: That the council approve of the action taken by the Government for the promotion of a general system of planting shade trees in the several municipalities, and with a view of the more effectual protection of the trees planted they would pray that an act to prohibit telegraph or telephone companies placing poles or other plant in such position as may tend to injure the trees so planted. Also that telegraph or telephone companies be prohibited from cutting or mutilating any tree or trees placed in such position as might injure them in any way.

The petition was adopted and passed and the clerk instructed to send the same to the Provincial Treasurer in Toronto. On motion the Warden left the chair for a few minutes to permit the committee to appoint their chairman.

The chairmen of the several committees having been appointed the Warden again took the chair, and the council adjourned till 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

Scalding Accident. An accident of a most serious nature occurred at the Lindsay Paper Mills yesterday afternoon, resulting in the scalding of three of the men employed at the straw vats in so serious a manner that one at least is in danger of losing his life. The man who has charge of the straw vats in which the straw is boiled became disabled the day before by a scalded foot, and in his place yesterday were Messrs. McIntyre, Baldwin and Beamish. It appears they did not understand the gauge of the steam or else forgot to keep it in proper check and very soon too much was let on to the boiling straw. The first intimation they had that anything was wrong was a hissing sound, and immediately the straw was thrown violently up towards the roof and steam and boiling water enveloped the men. The poor victims were taken into the office and everything was done to mitigate their suffering that could be till the arrival of Dr. DeGrass and Rogers who were soon on the spot with bandages and everything requisite. Mr. McIntyre's scalds were found to be very severe over his whole body and it is doubtful indeed if he can recover, and Mr. Beamish and Mr. Baldwin are very severely injured. All are men with families, who cannot fail to feel the misfortune that have befallen their husbands and fathers keenly.
