600 Miles from Winnipeg.

(To the Katter of the Warder.) Sir, I thought that I would take the privilege of sending you a few lines of my travels since I left my native home and perhaps it may do some body good. I left Omemos on the 5th day of April, 1881, for the great North-west. I took the Midland R. R. and the W. P. P., then the G. T.R. R. to Toronto, then I took the G. W. R., I left there on the 5th at noon, We got to Detriot about 4 a. m. I give the G. W. the credit for the fastest time and the smoothest riding coaches that I rode in. We were a little behind on account of some delay on the G. T., and I suppose that was the cause why we got such a quick ride. We got to Chicago on the 7th, it was nearly night when we got there. I can't say much about that city only I thought that it was very low and unhealthy. While we were there I saw some telegraph poles that there were 72 wires on and room for 8 more making a total of 80 wires on one pole. I might mention that Winnipeg has poles up now that there will be 70 wires on. That is not bad for this new city of ours. We got to St. Paul on the Sth, we had about hours and took a walk up town. It is a very fine city, I would like to live there very much indeed, but I can't bear to live under the stars and stripes. We left St. Paul for Winnipeg at 5 o'clock, the train engine to start us out of the city. We got into Winnipeg about 10 p. m. on the 9th, I was glad to get to my journey's end for I was tired of it. I found the city of Winnipeg a fine city, much better than I expected and there are thousands of Ont. people that do think about the same as I did, but when they see the city they are surprised. It is a great business place and that is well-known to some of the Ont. folks. The H. B. Co. have a very fine brick building. I was informed that the brick cost \$72 per 1,000. There are some more very fine buildings too numerous to mention. I might say this about the railway that when I came to this city that there was only the main track and one siding, now there is the small number of 40. There is a round house that will held 21 engines, and four freight sheds, each one is something like 780 feet long and about 40 feet wide. We also can say that there are 4 bridges over the Red River and two over the Assiniboine. There are a great many other things that I do and about 40 feet wide. There are a great many other things that I do not wish to mention, as I think that I am taking up too much space of your valuable paper. I left Winnipeg on the 5th of July last for Prince Albert. We got there on the 8th day of August, Between Brandon and Fort Ellice there is some very fine land and some poorly between the latter and Qu'Appel. There is some splendid land, but broken in some places by slews between Qu'Appel birch wood; some poor and some good, nothing to boast of between the latter and Humbolt. It is something of the same between the latter and Carrot river. There is some of the finest land I think that I ever saw 26 miles from Humbolt. It is a grand sight to see, but there is no timber. I found Prince Albert much larger than I expected. It is on the North Saskatchewan, a nice place, but the couptry can raise good crope. Last summer I helped to take 6ff the hervest. I worked with Wm. Lytle, of Peterboro, and he had as good a crop as I ever saw. He is doing well up there. The Prince Albert folks are going to have a railroad there pretty seen. The company is to start in the spring. You might have seen it mentioned in some of your papers about a company in Hamilton, Ont., going to build a railroad from Qu'Appel to Prince Albert, so if this be true and the C. P. R. is going to build 400 miles next summer you may bet that there will be good wages next summer. I was informed that there were \$3,000,000 worth of contracts let in Regins already, besides all the other cities and towns. I now think that I will draw to a close with this letter. I will give you some of the prices of some things:—Wheat, 76 to 80; oats, 50; butter, 85 to 40; eggs, 40; beef, 15 to 20c. per lb.; pork, 20c. per lb.; potatoes \$1.25; wood per cord, \$6 to 9c. Wages for carpenters, \$2.26 to 6; masons something about the same, laborers, \$2 to 8; fearnaters per month, \$30 to 40. Prices above are Winnipeg.
