Dr. Wild, of Toronto, expressed the opinion that if the present destruction of forests was allowed to continue, in a few years hence there would be only two seasons in Canada, namely, summer and winter. It was stated that an Act of Parliament protecting and encouraging the growing of trees on highways would come into force that afternoon. The next meeting will be held in Guelph.

THE County Orange Lodge of Victoria met in Lindsay on Tuesday and held their annual meeting for the election of officers for the year and other business in connection with the Grand Lodge, which is to meet in Lindsay in the month of March. THE retiring president of the Eastern Dairyman's Association of Ontario in his address on Wednesday brought out in a forcible way the importance to butter makers of producing the best possible article. He said there were 50,000,000 pounds of butter exported from this country in one year, and that this butter would average about 10 cents per pound more if it were up to the proper standard. Thus he claimed the country loses in a single year \$5,000,000 through its butter being poor. This is an eloquent showing and one which should claim the attention of those butter makers who are getting poor prices for their product.
