Peck vs. Fell.

(To the Editor of the Warder.)

Sir,—As the election for the Local House is now at hand it is the duty of every elector to decide for whom he should vote. This no doubt will seem an easy matter to strong partisans, who, while supporting their respective parties generally have their particular private interest in view, but to the conscientious elector the task does not appear so easily performed. He is actuated by a desire to cast his vote in favor of the man and party who in his opinion are best calculated to carry on the affairs of the country in a manner which may bring credit to the elector as well as to the representative, and in doing so it is of the first importance that the representative be an honest man, because it is an honest man, one in whom you have confidence, you feel safe, whereas in a dishonest character, although he may profess his attachment to the party in whom you have most confidence, you feel that it is not only a disgrace to the riding which he represents but that you cannot trust him, and you do not wish to see him governing the town or country. It often happens that a man who is not a dishonest character, but who is not a conscientious character, and the other a dishonest man, there is very little difficulty in deciding the matter.

This, then, is the position of affairs in the north riding of Victoria, the case, S. B. Peck, has been found to be most unprincipled, a man who has once sold himself politically, and who is quite ready to repeat the performance the first opportunity that offers, and not only this but who has almost ruined the back country by pocketing the people's money, and this is the man who is now going through this neighborhood professing his honesty and his attachment to this part of the country, the man who presented himself before the county council a short time ago to advise them of the best means of getting out of the rain he has brought upon them, but I have not heard that he offered to refund the lost money, nobody expects him to do that because that would be an honorable course. Yet this is the man whom the Government bring out to represent the people of North Victoria. I believe that it was brought about by S. C. Wood, a member of the Government, who probably has a grudge against the people of the north. And I think I may safely say to J. A. Barron as mover and J. E. Gould as seconder of Peck's nomination that they have lost the respect of the best Reformers of the north riding of Victoria. I have no doubt these two men feel something like a certain nerve who last year voted for Peck as warden, but who expressed himself a short time afterwards as being ashamed to see the man in the warden's chair.

In Mr. Fell we have an honest man, at least we have not heard of his being found guilty of pocketing money that did not belong to him, a man who as a farmer should know best how to represent the farmer. We are aware that Peck professes to be a farmer; we are also aware that he would profess anything else that he thought would secure a vote.

Between these men we think there will be no difficulty in deciding how to vote, and we trust that every man who has the interest of the riding at least will come forward on the 27th and vote for an honest and upright man, instead of one who is a disgrace alike to the riding and party to which he belongs.
