> Mr. McIntyre on Tuesday told an ingenious little fib about the license money, not the first one by any means by the way. He said "it had been charged that we did not receive as much from licensee now as we did under the old system," but Mr. Mointyre knows very well this "charge" was never made by any one. What is charged is that the Government keeps back from the county of Victoria \$2,400 which it has no right to, and which should go into the county treasury to pay taxes instead of being squandered in cork-screw expeditions and sprees in Chicago. How does this suit him :- "Whosoever being employed in the service of any municipality and entrusted by virtue of such employment with the receipt or control of any money embezzles, or in any manner fraudulently applies or disposes of the same to his own use or for any purpose whatsoever, except for the service of such municipality, shall be deemed to have feloniously stolen the same from such municipality, and shall be liable to be imprisoned in the penitentiary for any term not exceeding fourteen years, or in any gaol for any term less that two years."

A DEPUTATION compisting of Hon. Mr. Bowell, Messrs. Williams, J. R. Dundas, Cochrane, McCarthy, Burnham, Hilliard, had an audience last week with the Minister of Public Works asking for a grant to assist in completing the works now in progress in Midland harbor. Petitions from the Midland Railroad, from the village of Midland, and other municipalities praying for assistance had been received by the Minister. The subject was introduced by Mr. Dundas, member for South Victoria, who presented interesting figures respecting the expenditure made by the Midland railway on that harbor, and the estimate of the smount required to complete the works : also as to the trade of that port, which originated only two years ago, and has since obtained wonderful proportions. This was without any assistance of any kind, either from Government or municipality. It is estimated that there will be required to finish the improvements in the harbor now in progress, about \$66,000, and to assist in these improvements the Midland milway ask for an appropriation. The deputation was cordially received by Sir Hector Langevin, who promised to give the subject the fullest consideration.
