The following circular was issued Saturday by the Grand Master of Oddfellows.—To the subordinate lodges in Ontario:—Whereas, it has come to our knowledge that some members of the order are not conversant with the provisions of the law regarding lotteries and gift enterprises; and whereas, all such schemes are demoralizing in their tendency and pernicious in their effects, and entirely contrary to the principles of Oddfellowship; and whereas, any Oddfellow taking part in a lottery or gift enterprise is guilty of a violation of the moral law and also of a violation of the law of the land and the law of the order; now therefore all lodges and brothers are hereby informed that no lodge or any of the members thereof shall in the name of the order resort to any scheme of reflex, lotteries, or gift enterprises, or schemes of hazard, or chance of any kind as a means to raise funds for any purpose of relief or assistance to such individuals or to individual members; and that any violation of this prohibition will render the offending lodge or brothers liable to suspension.

Mr. H. G. Venno's Weather Bulletin for March gives the following as the most probable dates of the March storms:—1st—A decided storm and blizzard with snow and in some sections rain (Maritime Provinces). The storm will extend southward to Washington, D. C. 3rd and 4th—General heavy storms. Chicago and west backed, also Nova Scotia. This storm will probably likewise be experienced in Great Britain, with snow. 10th and 12th—Very general and severe snow storms and blockades, extending far to westward. Rains and snow falls Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Tremendous snow drifts in Western States. 17th to 20th—General heavy snow and rainstorms south to New York and Washington. Snow blockades again west. On 20th or 21st great wind storm at New York. 27th—Another general storm period. Snow and rains. Newfoundland snow blocked. 30th and 31st—General snow, wind and rain storms. Heavy blow and rains New York and middle States seaboard. Snow and rain storms Maritime Provinces. The month will be one of the stormiest experienced in a long period of years and there is a probability of great destruction of life and property. The storm period of the 12th to 16th will undoubtedly be severe and wide-spread. The heavy rain and wind storms of the 27th to 30th may cause the greatest harm, particularly towards New York and middle States.
