Like some other foolish journals the Post permits its jealousy to get the better of its faith in its party.

BEWAILING THEIR FATE.

The Port Perry Standard says:—"With a good many other lovers of Liberal principles we very much regret the loss to the Mowat Government of North Victoria. And yet, with a Yankee adventurer in the field, the result was what might reasonably have been expected. Mr. Peck, by his public pickings, had made himself as odious to the people as he could well be. But Mr. Peck was not altogether to blame. Indeed, we blame the Hon. S. C. Wood much more than he. But for Mr. Wood North Victoria would to-day be represented by a supporter instead of an opponent of the Mowat Government. Mr. Peck declined running; but Mr. Wood wanted to show his influence in North Victoria to Mr. Peck, to the Government and to the people, and he did so with a vengeance. We regret the fact of his doing so, because it will be a hard matter to undo what Mr. Wood has done. Mr. Peck is a popular old Yorkshireman, and he will make it his particular business to retain his seat. If, however, Mr. J. E. Gould had been the nominee, as he would have been but for Mr. Wood's interference, Mr. Peck's broken English would have been unavailing, and Mr. Gould would to-day have held the seat."

It is rather amusing to see to what trouble our Grit friends go in order to let themselves down easy in their defeats and the many and varied excuses they offer in extenuation. But this from the Port Perry Standard is the most unique. Yet although it is directly opposite to the theory advanced by the Post it certainly smacks of more truth in many respects than does the "bribery and corruption" twaddle of its Lindsey contemporary. Mr. S. C. Wood no doubt will be and should be blamed for endeavoring to foist S. S. Peck on an intelligent constituency that knew his weaknesses too well, and as events have proved is not slow to punish what it knows to be wrong; but to say that S. S. Peck did not desire to run, and that the Reform party outside of Mr. S. C. Wood did not want him to be untruthful in the extreme. As a matter of fact this individual, whom now they all endeavor to shun, was nominated by Mr. Barron, one of the aspiring Reformers of Lindsey, and Mr. J. E. Gould, another bright light of the party, seconded it. When making the nomination each of these gentlemen knew this man's history and each knew and discussed the question as to whether his election could be counted on as safe if "THE WARDER, the Mail and other papers" should see fit to show up his doings. In nominating him and supporting him in this election it made all of them as guilty of wrong-doing as Mr. S. C. Wood inasmuch as there was no necessity to condone his rascality in any way.

The sneer on the part of our Port Perry contemporary as to Mr. Fell's "broken English" comes with a bad grace from a journal of the calibre of the Port Perry Standard, who as is well known cannot very well set up as a guardian of the Queen's English. Mr. Fell's "broken English" can at all events make the wants of his constituency known in the House, and will at all times be ready to protect the honor of his constituents, something that cannot be claimed for the Standard if all be true that is reported regarding its escapades a short time ago. Before our contemporary begins talking about matters it evidently does not understand and bringing charges against particular men which it knows must be charged against the party as a whole, we would suggest it first learns to be truthful and in future keeps its pedantic rudeness inside its sanctum till it learns better manners and a little common sense. It will be time enough then to favor the public with its views regarding North Victoria and its future outlook.
