EAST VICTORIA TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION. The half yearly convention was held at Lindsay on Wednesday and Thursday, March 21st and 22nd. The proceedings commenced on Wednesday morning with an address by the president, Mr. J. H. Knight, in which he discussed the proposed changes in the teachers' and other examinations, ease in grammar, health of pupils, health of morals, and the bible in schools. Mr. Sherwood then read a paper on books of reference. The various reports were then read and committees appointed. In the afternoon Mr. D. J. Grogan, head master of the public school in Kert Hope, discussed the subject of geography, recommending teachers and pupils to draw their own maps, and in teaching to deal with important matters only, and discard the learning of mere lists of names. Mr. Kirkland, science master at the normal school, Toronto, took the subject of algebra. The convention adjourned at 4:30. In the evening Mr. Kirkland gave a lecture on "Succession of life on the earth," illustrated by the stereopticon. God. Deacon presided. The attendance was good and all were delighted with the representations and the lecturer's explanations. On Thursday, Mr. Kirkland gave a lecture on "Combustion," illustrated with experiments which were performed in a very satisfactory manner. The meeting then adjourned from the opera house to the Cambridge street school house, where Mr. Grogan took the subject of composition, giving an outline of the various stages from the 2nd class upwards, beginning with oral exercises, and ending with the most advanced written exercises. He laid great stress on the importance of teaching business forms and correspondence. The convention adjourned at noon. In the afternoon the following officers were appointed:—President—W. J. Hallett; 1st vice-president—W. M. Elliott; 2nd do.—G. J. Sherwood; secretary—G. A. Irving; secretary—J. McMillan;—Miss C. Hallett; committee—W. R. Tiley, S. Armour, W. J. O'Boyle, J. O'Brien, Miss Fyfe, Miss Rows and J. M. Knight. A discussion then followed on various subjects which had been introduced, and the convention adjourned at 4 o'clock.

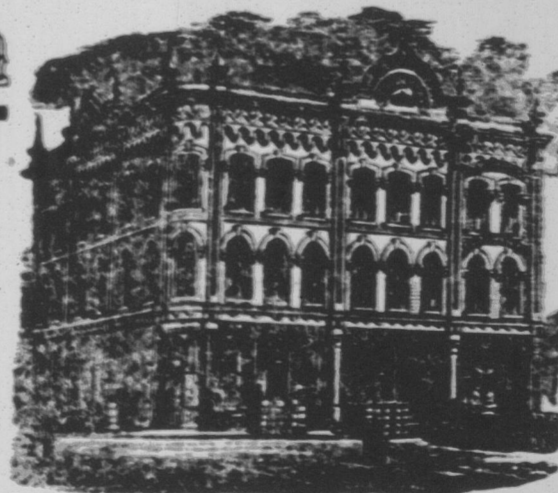
